Focus on Silica City ~ A new, smart city Destination ...

3800-acres-of-state-landidentified-for-developmentof-new-silica-city/

Minister of Housing and Water, Collin Croal, M.P, has announced that some 3,800 acres of land have been identified for immediate development of the new Silica City in the vicinity of the Soesdyke-Timehri area.

The Silica City development project is a brainchild of His Excellency, Dr. Mohamed Irfaan Ali who had proposed the city's establishment while serving as housing minister in 2013. The idea was based on the need for Guyana to have an urban centre that is complementary to the existing capital city of Georgetown.



Minister Croal explained that the project aims to tackle the issue of non-coastal urban settlement development and the challenges of climate change and sea-level rise. It will therefore see the creation of a vibrant, sustainable, resilient and modern city, and this vision is in keeping with the Low Carbon Development Strategy (LCDS).

"The 'smart city' approach is proposed for creating a new city that is compact, pedestrianoriented, energy-efficient, interconnected and sustainable, comfortable, attractive and secure.

new city over the next 20 years, will be approximately 50,000 or 12,500 households.

Therefore, within the first five years, it is expected that the city would be developed to cater for at least 3,125 households, approximately 625 units annually.

The master plan will integrate biophilic design and sustainable features, as well as health and wellbeing services, following a smart city model, which integrates artificial intelligence (AI) and other emerging technologies into its infrastructure.

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Nandu:Replica of India's Mukesh

One of Guyana's leading singers of a variety of Indian songs, Mohan Nandu, passed away Thursday night at Mercy hospital. He was taken ill at his home on Thursday and transported to Mercy by staff from SVN high school. He was ailing for some time. He was 87. He was a national hero, at least for Indians in the field of music, and he received a national medal of services for his contributions in that area.

Mohan ji was from Anna Catherina and lived in the house he was born all his life. He was a very simple, humble, down to earth man. He was very popular as a singer especially in Demerara. Berbicians and Essequibians saw much less of him and had to be contented to hearing him on radio or listening to his cassettes. They all loved him. He had a golden voice, an exact replica of the great Mukesh of Mumbai.

Mohan came from a family of singers. His father was an accomplished and popular taan singer and musician and his mother a religious woman; he also had a sister. Nandu began singing at an early age, and he has been singing classical songs and playing the harmonium since the 1940s entertaining audiences throughout the country. He sang at weddings, baraats,

pujas, satsangs, Mandirs, Bhagwat's or jags and Ramayans, and at concerts and on radio. He sang at several fundraisers including for the PPP. He also partook in Indian singing competitions, winning many trophies in the Mukesh competition. He belted out unforgettable classical and religious hits, evergreen melodies. Everywhere, people yearned to hear him sing and crowded his performances. Mandirs and halls reverberated with applause. He was very close to another iconic singer Shri Gobin Ram. They made quite a team and entertained thousands in West Dem.

Mohan's singing icon from Bollywood was the legendary Mukesh, the playback singer for thousands of films. Singing and music were his first love, and he learned Hindi songs from Bollywood.

Hindi films have always been an attraction and a mirror of almost every

Indian Guyanese. They were embedded in the psyche of Indians. And they imitated the Hindi songs of the films. Nandu learned by seeing the films, imitating the songs especially of Mukesh who sang for dozens of actors, and practicing them for perfection. And was he perfect? According to Bollywood singers who performed at concerts in Guyana, on listening to Nandu, they said he sang exactly like Mukesh. One of the professional Bollywood performers offered to take Nandu to sing in Bollywood.

Hailing from the West Coast, he entertained crowds mostly in West Demerara restricting Berbicians and Essequibians access to enjoy his musical talent. They only saw him perform in person at concerts on the Corentyne, West Berbice, and Essequibo or when he accompanied popular Pandit Reepudaman Persaud at Ramayana discourses. He accompanied Pt Reepu to countless kathas all over the country. Mohan was very close to Pandit Reer whose Dharmic Sabha honored him f lifelong contributions to Indian cultur It is noted that he was one of only a few artistes who did not migrate for opportunities to make a name oversea – quite a patriot. And for that, Guyanese are grateful. He was deserv ing of national honors

As he was ailing over the last fey years, friends and Swami Aksharananda provided for Mohan Nandu's medicine, meals, house cleaning, and general upkeep.

The inimitable king of melody from West Demerara is gone. Guyanese in the diaspora in America remember him with deep sorrow. Although he has departed, he still lives with us in his many songs that are no available on You Tube and elsewhere His departure is a loss to Indian arts.

CARPHA: Beware of the Sahara Dust

The Caribbean Public Health Agency (CARPHA) in Trinidad is encouraging people across the Caribbean to take preventative measures against the health consequences triggered by a significant Saharan dust plume.

This natural phenomenon has engulfed several regions, posing potential health risks.

According to the Caribbean Institute for Meteorology and Hydrology (CIMH) based in Barbados, there is a strong likelihood that the levels of particulate matter in the air will surpass the World Health Organization's (WHO) guidelines for 24-hour outdoor air quality.

This prediction raises concerns about air purity and the necessity for immediate public health interventions.

Dr. Joy St John, the executive director of CARPHA, emphasizes the detrimental impact of Saharan dust on air quality.

She points out that the increase in airborne particulate matter could pose serious health hazards, particularly to vulnerable groups such as young children, the elderly, and individuals with pre-existing lung and heart conditions, including asthma, allergies, and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease

Map shows Saharan dust blanketing the entire Caribbean region (COPD). In response to the deteriorating air quality, CARPHA advises the public to adopt several protective strategies.

> These include staying indoors to limit exposure to dust, wearing dust masks when outside, and using HEPA

filters to clean the air inside homes.

Additionally, individuals with respiratory conditions are urged to keep their medication accessible, adhere to prescribed treatments, and seek medical attention if they experience difficulty breathing.

For milder symptoms, over-thecounter allergy medications may offer relief.

By taking these precautions, the Caribbean community can mitigate the health impacts of the Saharan dust plume and safeguard their well-being during this environmental challenge.

Last year, Dr Drew made international headlines after saving a pssenger on a flight.

Dr. Drew recommended that the passenger be removed from the flight and examined in a specialized facility. He was sent to the JNF hospital for additional medical care.

Trinidad and Tobago hit by mystery ship oil spill

Trinidad and Tobago is considering declaring a national emergency over a huge oil spill from a ship that ran aground and overturned this week.

At least 15km (nine miles) of Tobago's south-western coast have been affected, including some of the Caribbean island's pristine beaches.

Some 1,000 volunteers have now joined government staff to clean up the spill.

Divers have been trying to isolate the leak from the vessel, which was abandoned by its crew.

Farley Augustine, the chief secretary of the island of Tobago, on Saturday said the government may designate the accident a Level 3 disaster, the highest.

"Everything indicates that we are going in that direction," he was quoted as saying by the AFP news agency.

The spill is currently Level 2, meaning the Office of Disaster Preparedness and Management believes that the country can deal with the spill.

A national emergency is declared when local resources become "overwhelmed" and international assistance is needed.

The ship - identified only as The

Gulfstream - capsized last Wednesday off the coast of the Cove Eco-Industrial Estate.

No emergency calls were made.

The incident happened just days before Trinidad and Tobago's carnival celebrations, which are an important source of income for its economy.

Florida schools say kids must get parents' permission for BHM lessons

As Black History Month takes center stage in South Florida schools this February, parents are finding themselves at a crossroads as they are asked to sign for their children's involvement in educational events.

Reports are that parents are being asked whether they want their children to participate in various Black History Month educational events, including "class and school wide presentations showcasing the achievements and recognizing the rich and diverse traditions, histories, and innumerable contributions of the Black communities."

The policy, which requires parental consent for participation in such events, is a direct result of an extension of a new state board rule.

According to WPLG Local 10, Miami-Dade School Board Member Steve Gallon said that the policy is an extension of a new state board rule.



Parents must give their children permission to learn Black History

This policy stems from the Parental Bill Of Rights, enacted in November last year.

Gallon acknowledged the importance of adhering to the law, but he also expressed concerns about the potential unintended consequences on students who do not attend these events.

Marvin Dunn, an African-American history expert from Florida International University, believes that parental involvement in this decision could lead to unequal learning. Dunn argued that when parents become involved in making that decision, keeping some kids out and allowing others in, will lead to unequal learning.

He pointed out that this move could potentially create a generation of individuals who are miseducated when it comes to Black history.

WPLG Local 10 reports that Dunn further criticized the Governor's administration for interfering in the classroom, asserting that it is having a chilling effect on educators and the curriculum.

"The intent of the DeSantis attack on education is to make schools more cautious, to make teachers more cautious about what they taught, and it's working," he said. "It's not about banning books necessarily, it's about banning ideas," he added. Maintaining the balance between our 7 peoples — Guyana

Guyana to get its own UWIcertified medical school

In a significant development for medical education in Guyana, President Irfaan Ali announced on Sunday that discussions are in progress to establish the University of the West Indies' (UWI) School of Medicine in the country.

The school will be located in East Berbice-Corentyne, in Region Six.

There is no timeline yet for the opening of the UWI School of Medicine in Guyana.

President Ali shared this exciting news during the commissioning ceremony of the Pathology Lab at the Georgetown Public Hospital Corporation.

This development follows closely on the heels of the groundbreaking ceremony for the New Amsterdam Hospital, where President Ali revealed plans for a dedicated building to accommodate academic activities.

President Ali emphasized the col-

laborative nature of this endeavor, stating, "When we launched the New Amsterdam Hospital, we said that in that facility we negotiated a building for teaching services, and that message went out regionally and globally. Today, I'm pleased to inform you that the University of the West Indies School of Medicine has now approached us to be part of this vision in bringing their campus to Guyana and negotiations and discussions would have commenced."

Ali added that in the negotiations, they are now working on ensuring that the rates are the same as local students in Trinidad and Tobago so there will be "equity and quality matched together."

Acknowledging the existence of the University of Guyana's School of Medicine, President Ali recognized the importance of competition in fostering continuous improvement.

He stated that "Competition is a part of life and a necessity in improving quality."

Guyana pledges to help Palestine

Guyana has pledged to contribute a substantial sum of USD\$150,000 to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA).

The Caribbean nation's commitment aims to provide assistance to Palestinians who have been displaced and adversely affected by the ongoing conflict in the Gaza Strip.

Ongoing Conflict's grim toll The ongoing conflict in the Gaza Strip, which began on October 7, 2023, has had devastating consequences, claiming the lives of more than 25,000 people.

The situation remains a pressing concern on the global stage, with Guyana and other nations striving for a peaceful resolution to this prolonged and tragic conflict.

A strong international appeal Guyanese Ministry of Foreign Affairs said on Thursday that its decision to support UNRWA resonates with its call for a more robust international response to the persisting crisis in Gaza.

As an elected member of the United Nations Security Council, Guyana is actively advocating for a ceasefire that would facilitate the delivery of humanitarian aid to the war-torn

region.

Consistent support over the years Guyana said it has consistently provided financial aid to UNRWA over the years.

UNRWA serves as the primary hu-

manitarian organization that offers vital support to over 2 million Palestinians.

The country added that it is prepared to work as a member of the UN Security Council and with the entire UN membership to accelerate the vision of two independent states living side by side in peace and security and of a peaceful Middle East.

Quebec's winter carnival a success in spite of Spring-like weather

Organizers of Quebec City's annual winter carnival say the 18-day event was a hit despite unseasonably warm weather that forced the carnival to close one of its main attractions on the last day.

As temperatures climbed up to 4 C, a nine-room ice palace, known as Bonhomme's Palace, began to melt and was closed prematurely on Sunday for safety reasons, says Carnaval de Québec general manager Marie-Ève Jacob.

The palace was only viewable from the outside for the remainder of the event.

"We had some challenges, but it's challenges we're used to having," said Jacob.

It wasn't the first time comparatively balmy temperatures caused problems for this year's carnival organizers.

The ice dome at the event's sculpture garden also had to be closed on Thursday due to safety concerns as temperatures lingered above the freezing mark.

The winter event wrapped up its 70th edition this weekend. This year,

the festival stretched eight days longer with new attractions, requiring about 20 times more artificial snow than last year.

While the mild temperature may have taken its toll on the facilities, it also may have helped attract festival goers, says Jacob.

"Both the first weekend and the last, our numbers were up, so the mild weather was an advantage," she said. Jérôme Déchêne, the carnival's director of programming, says new activities and attractions likely also contributed to the surge in numbers.

He highlights the large-scale opening show, which brought together 50 artists and drew thousands of people, the return of the Bal de Bonhomme, a masked ball which sold out, as well as two night parades, which drew thousands of spectators.

"This year, we were adding new sites and a new week, so it was a challenge for the team," said Déchêne, adding the format was dedicated to the 70th anniversary of the event and will not be repeated next year. The 71st Carnaval de Québec will take place from Feb. 7 to 16, 2025, with hopes for cold weather, says Jacob.

Ottawa U clamps down on protests

The National Council of Canadian Muslims (NCCM) and physicians at the University of Ottawa are demanding action from the school's senior administration about what they call a "campaign of persecution" against students, staff and doctors who have publicly expressed pro-Palestinian views.

In a letter sent to the school Jan. 31, the NCCM said it has learned of several recent instances of "harassment, intimidation, targeting and threatening behaviour" toward those advocating for "the basic human rights of civilian Palestinians."

Uthman Quick, the NCCM's director of communications, said several students have contacted the organization to say they were threatened with suspension or even expulsion for social media posts calling for a ceasefire in Gaza and an end to the targeted bombing of medical centres there.

While this has been an issue across Canada since the most recent conflict between Israel and Hamas began on Oct. 7, the situation at U of O "seems very acute," said Quick.

He said the council has received

several complaints from staff and students about what's being described as "a climate of fear" on campus.

"There is a very tense situation on campus there, and it needs to be addressed," said Quick.

The NCCM's letter goes on to say the university has "sullied its own reputation," and "failed" in upholding its ethical standards and protecting staff and students who publicly side with Palestinians during the conflict.

In an email to CBC, the university did not respond to the NCCM's letter, nor did it address allegations that students were threatened with suspension or expulsion.

"People are being called to the office and told that their social media posts, things that they're sharing, are antisemitic or make other people feel unsafe," said Dr. Yipeng Ge, a public health and preventive medicine resident at U of O.

The equation to antisemitism is "extremely harmful and manifests itself as anti-Palestinian racism," he said.

Ge himself was suddenly suspended in November after other faculty members complained about a series of pro-Palestinian posts he'd made that included references to "apartheid" and "settler colonialism" in Gaza.

He was reinstated by the faculty of medicine in January, but has since chosen not to continue with the program.

Members challenged the GBTI Representative on the restrictions on mortgage amounts and procedures that banks allow for foreign ownership and were vocal about the challenges they face to operate within the GRA/banking environment.

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

Hindu religious site in Malaysia is getting a major upgrade

The custodians of an ancient Hindu religious site in Malaysia are planning to install an escalator as an alternative for those visitors either unable or unwilling to climb the 272 steps leading to its temple and cave shrines.

The Batu Caves are one of Malaysia's most popular tourist attractions. They serve as a religious site for Hindu worshippers and are the focal point of the annual Thaipusam festival every year.

Located a few miles north of the capital Kuala Lumpur, the site is thought to be around 400 million years old and is easily recognizable by its towering flight of rainbow stairs, which have made it popular with Instagrammers.

To reach the temple housed in a limestone cave at the top, visitors must currently climb 272 steps.

Adding an escalator would make the site "more accessible," a spokesperson for the site's management committee told a press conference Friday.

"We hope the government will assist us since this (escalator) will allow the disabled and elderly who are unable to climb the steps to reach the main temple," said temple committee chairman R. Nadarajah.


Construction of the escalator, as well as a new "multipurpose hall" will begin after this year's Thaipusam festival which falls on January 25, Nadarajah added.

The hall is estimated to cost around 35 million Malaysian (\$7.5 million), Nadarajah said. He did not say how much the escalator would cost.

Tourists visiting Malaysia flock to the Batu Caves to see their famous rainbow stairs, which were painted as part of an effort by the temple's organizing committee to attract more people to the site.

Batu Cave officials say the strategy has worked, pointing out the colorful stairs have become popular with Instagrammers.

However, the rejuvenation has also courted controversy with the Malaysian heritage board, which says the steps were painted before the makeover was approved.

"I think any Caribbean museum should have a little piece of Bob. So I will be donating to the museum one of my father's guitars. Treat it nice, okay?" she said after accepting her award on stage, presented by Island SPACE President Calibe Thompson.

Cedella has not only contributed to the preservation of Bob Marley's legacy, but has also made significant contributions to Jamaican culture and sports.

She is the CEO of her father's recording label, Tuff Gong International. She also helps run her family's charitable organization, 1Love.

Cedella is the acting director of the Bob Marley Foundation, which seeks to deliver social interventions throughout Jamaica through educational and community development initiatives. Additionally, she oversees Hope Road Merchandising, LLC, a Marley family entity that manages the rights to Bob's name and likeness, and the Marley merchandising conglomerate House of Marley.

Up until last month, she was also a sponsor and official ambassador of the Jamaica Reggae Girlz team. She most notably helped fund the team through their surprise qualification for the 2019 FIFA Women's World Cup.

This biopic marks the first time that Bob Marley's life and musical journey is being showcased on the big screen

Produced in partnership with the Marley family, the film stars Kingsley Ben-Adir as Marley, alongside Lashana Lynch as Rita Marley, and James Norton as Chris Blackwell.

Jamaicans featured in the movie include musicians Naomi Cowan, J-Summa, Aston Barrett Jr., Hector Roots Lewis, Sheldon Shepherd, and singer Sevana.

Filming took place in London, where Marley spent those critical years, and Jamaica.

The film is being regarded as a pivotal moment for Jamaica's tourism and film sectors, according to Jamaica's Minister of Tourism, Edmund Bartlett.

Exit surveys revealed an overwhelmingly positive response, with a staggering 80% of moviegoers expressing a strong inclination to recommend the movie to others. On top of that, Bob Marley: One Love is riding high with a stellar 95% audience score on Rotten Tomatoes.

Looking beyond US borders, the film is set to make waves internationally, with premieres scheduled in 47 markets this week, including Australia, Benelux, Brazil, France, Germany, Mexico, Scandinavia, Spain, and the United Kingdom.

Shamar Joseph makes history as first West Indian to secure ICC Player of the Month

Fast-bowling sensation Shamar Joseph has made history by becoming the first West Indian cricketer to be awarded the International Cricket Council's Player of the Month for January, following his outstanding performances in the recent two-Test series against Australia.

Joseph's remarkable display saw him claim 13 wickets during the series, earning him the Man of the Series title. His standout moment came in the final Test match in Brisbane, where he produced a sensational spell, taking seven wickets for just 68 runs to help secure an eight-run victory for the West Indies and their first Test win on Australian soil in nearly three decades.


Expressing his delight at receiving the award, the 24-year-old stated, "I am extremely delighted to win this award. To get such an award on the world stage feels special."

Reflecting on his memorable performance in Brisbane, Joseph added, "Taking the wicket to win the match was a dream! Joseph's impactful debut on the international stage saw him make an immediate impression, with a fivewicket haul in the first innings of the opening Test in Adelaide. Miles Bascombe, Director of Cricket for Cricket West Indies (CWI), extended congratulations to Joseph on behalf of the organization, expressing optimism for his future in West Indies cricket. "On behalf of Cricket West Indies, I wish to congratulate Shamar on this award. May it be the first of many in what is hopefully a long career in maroon," Bascombe stated.

Joseph's recognition as the ICC Player of the Month underscores his exceptional talent and contributions to West Indies cricket, further solidifying his status as a key player in the team's



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ExxonMobil plans offshore oil exploration in spite of Venezuela's incursions

ExxonMobil, the US oil and energy giant, announces intentions to explore for oil offshore the Essequibo region, where Venezuelan gunboats previously chased seismic research vessels in oil concessions granted by Guyana six years ago.

Alistair Routledge, President of ExxonMobil Guyana, reveals plans to drill two exploration wells west of Liza and Payara. Despite tensions, Routledge assures that the exploration activities will proceed as planned.

Venezuela's President Nicolas Maduro unilaterally extended the maritime boundary in 2015, leading to naval interceptions of research vessels in 2018. Despite concerns, Routledge affirms the legality of ExxonMobil's agreement with Guyana under local and international law.

ExxonMobil plans to invest approximately US\$60-70 million in each exploration well, with potential cost escalation for additional data gathering and stem drill tests.

Routledge welcomed the Argyle Declaration between Guyana and Venezuela, emphasizing collaboration between the US and Guyana in defence, diplomacy, and energy supply.

Guyana will capitalize on carbon credits to increase its revenue

Guyana is strategically focusing on increasing its revenue from carbon credits as it strives to mitigate its environmental impact, especially in light of its burgeoning offshore oil reserves, Latin Finance reports.

In late 2022, this South American nation inked a significant agreement with US-based oil and gas producer Hess Corporation. Finance Minister Ashni Singh indicated to Latin Finance that Guyana is poised to initiate new carbon credit deals when the market conditions are favorable. The agreement with Hess, a member of a consortium involved in oil exploration in Guyana, encompasses a value of \$750 million in carbon credits spread over a 15-year period.

This landmark deal accounts for approximately one-third of the total carbon credits that Guyana can offer, according to Singh. He expressed that they received multiple offers when finalizing the agreement with Hess, affirming that there is substantial interest from various parties. Singh, in an interview during the World Bank/IMF annual meeting in Marrakech, Morocco, emphasized the importance of timing to secure the best possible price, indicating that carbon credits represent the third source of income for the country, following domestic revenue mobilization and oil revenue. While Singh didn't rule out the possibility of issuing a sovereign bond in the future, Guyana is eager to establish its reputation in the carbon credit market.

The Hess deal holds particular significance for Guyana as private companies, led by ExxonMobil, are scaling up oil production more than 100 miles off its coast. With over 25 discoveries in Guyana's waters, the country is expected to produce approximately 1.2 million barrels of oil per day by 2027.

Guyana's first foray into carbon credits occurred in the early 2000s when it received around \$250 million from

Norway for its efforts in forest conservation. Notably, two-thirds of Guyana is covered by Amazon forests, and the government, under President Irfaan Ali, aims to leverage the country's impressive track record in averting rampant de-

forestation, setting it apart from other members of the Amazon Cooperation Treaty Organization. In a new category known as "high forest cover/low deforestation countries," Guyana ranks first among 33 nations globally. The government is resolute in its stance that preserving standing forests is an efficient means of combating climate change and seeks compensation for its conservation efforts.

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Government moves to address Venezuelan migrant influx into Guyana

Guyana Parliamentary Affairs and Governance Minister Gail Teixeira has announced that the Irfaan Ali government is exploring ways to enhance the documentation process for all Venezuelan migrants entering the country.

Minister Teixeira addressed concerns raised by the APNU and AFC Oppositions regarding the influx of migrants from neighboring Venezuela. according to iNews Guyana, and strongly refuted allegations that the government was granting citizenship to numerous Venezuelan migrants for political gain in the upcoming 2025 General and Regional Elections, characterizing such claims as unfounded and illogical.

Teixeira emphasized that there had not been a sudden surge in Venezuelan migrants in recent months; rather, there had been a consistent flow of individuals from Venezuela. She provided a detailed explanation of the citizenship acquisition process in Guyana, highlighting the requirement of five consecutive years of residency to become a citizen and the option of marriage to a Guyanese citizen, subject to scrutiny to prevent marriages of convenience.

The minister also acknowledged the need to review the existing citizenship procedures related to marriage, suggesting that couples should spend one year living together before applying. She clarified that even without this criterion, applicants for citizenship in Guyana must undergo background checks and community visits, a process that typically takes about one year to complete.

Teixeira stressed that gaining citizenship in Guyana was not an expedited process and emphasized that Venezuelans, upon becoming naturalized citizens, were granted voting rights—a privilege also extended to Commonwealth citizens residing in Guyana for one year.

Hackney, Friendship residents to soon benefit from potable water

A total of 1,600 persons living in Hackney and Friendship in Region Two will soon have a continuous supply of potable water, as two new wells are being drilled in the communities.

These wells will benefit 1,400 residents in Hackney and 200 residents in Friendship.

Overall, the two wells will service over 475 households within the Moruca/Providence Neighbourhood Democratic Council (NDC) under which the two communities fall.

Hackney's well which is being drilled at a depth of 288 feet along with the distribution network is slated to be completed by March month-end.

The well in Friendship is being drilled at a depth of 300 feet and its distribution network is anticipated to be completed within four weeks.

Meanwhile, Minister within the Ministry of Housing and Water, Susan Rodrigues explained that the Guyana Water Incorporated's (GWI) PAT Rig 421 being utilised to drill the wells is being carried out by the water company's in-house team.

While inspecting the ongoing works at the wells on Wednesday, Minister Rodrigues disclosed that pipes will also be installed along the waterfront at Hackney to provide purified water to passersby.

"Additionally, over 40 households in the immediate vicinity will receive connections to their own homes. We will also have standpipes in different areas. The schools [Hackney Nursery and Primary] will benefit from direct

connections to the well. We are very pleased with the progress we have here," she emphasised.

The communities' village councils will work along with the GWI's team to install the distribution networks.

The community of Marlborough is also slated for a new well.

Budget 2024 also caters for the drilling of new wells and installation of

water supply systems within the communities of Mashabo, St Denny's/ Tapakuma, St Monica, Dredge Creek, Baracaro, Bethany, and Wakapao.

"We have big plans for this region which we have started already...All of this will be completed before 2025," the minister assured.

Minister Rodrigues also distributed sporting gear to Hackney and Friendship.

She was accompanied by GWI's Hinterland Services Director, Jailall Ramchand; Prime Minister's Representative of Region Two, Arnold Adams; Overseer of the Moruca/Providence NDC, Althia Giles, other engineers and officials. (DPI)

Okamura further stressed, "The authorities have managed this transformation successfully, thus far, and we agreed that continuing to maintain macroeconomic stability and debt sustainability are paramount...We discussed the authorities' efforts to develop a large skilled labour force to ensure a balanced growth path with low inflation and opportunities for well-paying jobs throughout the country."

Guyana received further recognition for spearheading the effort to lower CARICOM's food import bill by 25 per cent by 2025 as it gets closer to attaining food security.

Windies wins final game, avoids a Down Under sweep

A record sixth-wicket partnership between the hard-hitting pair of Andre Russell and Sherfane Rutherford helped the West Indies avoid a series sweep in the third and final Twenty/20 international against Australia in Perth on Tuesday, with the regional team managing an impressive 37-run win.

After winning the toss, captain Rovman Powell's Windies team made a mammoth 220 for six in their 20 overs, with both Russell (71 off 29 balls) and Rutherford (67 not out off 40 balls) rattling off halfcenturies.

Leading the series 2-0 after wins in Bellerive and Adelaide, the Aussies tried their utmost to clinch a 3-0 series win. However, the Windies bowlers hit their lengths beautifully and kept the dangerous Australian batting order at bay to restrict them 183 for five in their 20 overs. Roston Chase led the Windies attack with figures of two for 19 and accounted for the wickets of Player-of-the-Series David Warner and Josh Inglis. Romario Shepherd grabbed two for 31, with second-match centurion Glenn Maxwell (12) being one of his scalps.

Warner top-scored for the hosts with 81 off 49 balls, with Tim David (41 not out off 19 balls) putting on a show at the back end of the innings with brutal power-hitting. Warner, 37, confirmed he had played his last game on Australian soil and he said he will bow out from international cricket at the end of this year's T20 World Cup in the Caribbean and the US.

"We did not start the series the way we wanted to start it. We had catch-up cricket to play," said Rusell, who was adjudged Man-of-the-Match. "We got it right tonight. Congrats to the boys. I think we had a total team effort."

Struggling at 79 for five in the ninth over after losing the wickets of Johnson Charles (four), Nicholas Pooran (one), Kyle Mayers (11), Chase (37 off 20 balls) and Powell (21 off 14 balls), the Caribbean team got a game-changing 139-run partnership off just 67 balls between Rutherford and Russell for the sixth wicket – the highest sixth-wicket

stand in the history of T20Is.

"I was not worried about (Rutherford) being on strike and getting more of the strike. He was going really well. I was just there supporting him."

West Indies were on 179 for five at the start of the penultimate over of their innings which was bowled by Adam Zampa. Russell was on 33 when he was dropped in the over by Tim David, and he made Australia pay by hitting four sixes and a four in the over to push West Indies' score well over 200.

The two-time T20 World Cup champions did not meet the objective of getting a T20I series win, but massive hitting by Russell and Rutherford, to go along with a fine all-round effort by Chase, saw the visitors pull a game back as the series ended 2-1 in the Aussies' favour.

"Congrats to Australia on the series win, but I think we are happy with where we are at as a team. To be here in Australia and scoring 200 runs consistently for the last three games is definitely a plus for us," Russell said.
