Reunion Gold says it can now proceed with accessing permits for the Oko West project in Guyana

Canadian gold company starts moves to operate in Guyana

Reunion Gold Corporation, one of several Canadian mining companies in Guyana's gold industry on Tuesday announced a significant step forward in its operations here.

The company revealed that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has finalized and approved the Terms of Scope (ToS) for the Environmental and Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) on the Oko West Project, located in Guyana's Region Seven (Cuyuni-Mazaruni).

Rick Howes, President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Reunion Gold, expressed his satisfaction with the approval, stating, "We are very pleased that the EPA has approved the Terms of Scope for the ESIA on Oko West, as this represents a significant milestone in the advancement of the permitting process for the project."

He highlighted the company's commitment to maintaining an accelerated development timeline, aiming to complete a preliminary economic assessment (PEA) by the end of the second quarter of 2024.

Reunion's journey toward this

milestone began in September 2023 when the company applied for its environmental permit.

Since then, Reunion Gold said it has worked closely with the EPA to establish the ToS for the ESIA. This collaborative effort included meetings with government agencies and local communities in late last year to identify the crucial elements to be incorporated into the ToS.

In addition to finalizing the ToS, Reunion Gold has made significant progress in completing the environmental and social baseline studies required for the ESIA. These studies encompassed various aspects, including groundwater and air quality, plant, animal, and aquatic ecosystems, as well as socio-economic and health baselines. Community meetings were also conducted to address any potential cultural heritage considerations.

Looking ahead, Reunion Gold plans to complete its Preliminary Economic Assessment (PEA), by June 2024 and subsequently focus on advancing the feasibility study and environmental permits throughout the

remainder of 2024 and into the first quarter of 2025.

Reunion Gold is now actively considering both open-pit and underground mining.

The company aims to reach a construction decision by 2025, marking another crucial milestone in its journey toward operational readiness in Guyana's gold industry.

The Canadian mining company has firmly set its eyes on reaching gold production at its Oko West Gold Project by 2027. The company has an estimated 4.2 million ounces of gold.

In February 2024, Reunion announced an updated Mineral Resource Estimate (MRE) containing a total of 4.3 Moz of gold in Indicated Resources grading 2.05 g/t and 1.6 Moz of gold in Inferred Resources grading 2.59 g/t. The February 2024 MRE includes an underground Resource containing 1.1 Moz of gold at a grade of 3.12 g/t Au in the Inferred category.

It has been reported that the company's CEO, during an interview disclosed that they are on a fast tracked timeline with its Oko West project.

In 2020, the Company announced a new greenfield gold discovery at its Oko West project and announced its maiden mineral resource in June 2023 after just 22 months of resource definition drilling.

Since discovery, Howes noted that the resource estimate continues to grow, and that the deposit offers ample scale to underpin a meaningful mining operation. Last June, the company announced its maiden resource estimate of 2.5 million ounces of gold.

Reunion's CEO underscored that what sets the company apart is the meticulous execution of their strategy to advance the project through studies and permitting, to support the aggressive timeline, which was affirmed by over US\$70 million raised last September to fully fund the studies.

Reunion's CEO attributed being adequately capitalized to continue without further dilution as a major accomplishment for the company last year

Despite volatile markets, Reunion Gold was able to secure funding from La Mancha Investment Group.

Commonwealth citizens to benefit from enhanced access to justice

COMMONWEALTH law ministers have committed to addressing the legal needs of their citizens by removing barriers that hinder access to justice.

With some 2.5 billion Commonwealth citizens standing to benefit, law ministers concluded their meeting in Zanzibar, Tanzania, on Friday with a series of new measures and pledges.

The four-day deliberations, which included input from various stakeholders such as people with disabilities, civil society representatives, and legal innovators, resulted in a series of new measures and pledges.

Guyana's Attorney General and Minister of Legal Affairs, Mohabir Anil Nandlall, participated in the meeting.

Key provisions include improved access to justice for people with disabilities, a model law on virtual assets, a new action plan to combat online violence against women, and a proposal to eliminate gender-discriminatory legisla-

Additionally, ministers welcomed new Commonwealth legal resources, including a mediation guide, a small claims court app for dispute resolution, and a criminal co-operation database.

The adoption of Commonwealth guidelines on the treatment of electronic evidence in criminal proceedings was also highlighted.

To facilitate implementation, ministers called on the Commonwealth Law Ministers Action Group to report progress at the next meeting, summarising the outcome statement issued by ministers representing one-third of humanity which concluded last month.

Commonwealth Secretary-General, The Rt Hon Patricia Scotland KC, stressed the critical nature of these measures, noting that two-thirds of the world's population currently lack meaningful access to justice.

She highlighted the central role of closing the justice gap in realising the values and aspirations of the Commonwealth Charter, pinning technology as a vital tool in this endeavour.

"Our discussions have been purposeful, our decisions have been meaningful, and our powerful new consensus allows us to take the next giant steps forward towards equal access to justice, in

modernised legal systems, across our tice. wonderful Commonwealth.

"We leave Zanzibar with a powerful mandate which will allow us to take the next decisive steps to ensure justice for all is the lived experience of every one of the 2.5 billion people living in our Commonwealth," she said.

The Secretary General urged member countries to harness, understand and master the benefits of technology and innovation in breaking down barriers of cost and complexity, and delivering legal systems which can meet the justice needs of all.

In their statement, ministers recognised the Commonwealth Secretariat's tech-driven justice solutions and work on artificial intelligence as crucial interventions in improving access to legal information.

Hosted by the United Republic of Tanzania from March 4 to March 8, 2024, the meeting, chaired by Ambassador Dr Pindi H. Chana, the country's Minister of Constitutional and Legal Affairs, received commendation for its substantive outcomes.

President of Zanzibar, Hussein Mwinyi, acknowledged the achievements and encouraged efforts toward digitisation for improved access to jus-

In their statement of outcomes for the meeting, law ministers participated in a working session on mapping a people-centred justice approach to access to justice, emphasising evidence-based, data-driven solutions.

Ministers received a paper on online violence against women and girls, leading to the recommendation for the development of a Commonwealth Action Plan to Address Cyber Violence Against Women and Girls.

The plan recognises the urgent need for members to prioritise efforts in addressing this serious problem impacting women, girls, and other vulnerable groups across the Commonwealth.

"Law ministers were guided through a discussion which highlighted the approach through a practical example of a member country's development of a 10-year strategy on people-centred access to justice.


"Law ministers were encouraged to explore people centred innovative pathways to close the justice gap, which in some jurisdictions can extend to 55 per cent of the population. People centred solutions should be contextual, data driven and demonstrate potential for expansion or replication," the statement of outcome detailed.

The statement presented a summary of findings and recommendations contained in five regional reports addressing the role of bystanders in the context of online violence.

Law ministers recognised that online violence has escalated and noted the urgent need for members to take steps to prioritise efforts to address this serious problem impacting women and girls and other vulnerable groups across the Commonwealth, including taking legislative steps to address online violence against women and girls.

The outcomes from the meeting are set to shape the agenda for the upcoming Commonwealth Heads of Government Meeting (CHOGM) in Samoa later this year, with the next meeting scheduled to be hosted by the Government of Fiji in February 2026.

FIVE months into a vicious war on the people of Gaza, Muslims have now entered the holy month of Ramadan with a heart burdened by the pain of insurmountable suffering. Ramadan is a time for Muslims to seek out God's mercy, his forgiveness and respite from the torment in store for the wicked on Judgement Day. It is a month during which Muslims celebrate the Quran that was revealed to Prophet Muhammad in Arabia over 1,400 years ago.

But as Muslims in Guyana observe the fast of Ramadan from dawn to sunset, abstaining from water and food, many will assuredly weep much for the children, women and men of Gaza, the West Bank and East Jerusalem, who continue to be resolute in their devotion to God while surrounded by death, destruction and misery.

On Sunday March 10, I attended a rally in Georgetown organised by a team of inspired youth – "Guyana for Palestine." Like protests in major cities around the world, the organisers called for a permanent ceasefire and the Government of Guyana to examine its diplomatic and economic ties with the State of Israel.

The vast majority of those who participated in the rally were Muslims, but shockingly, only a very small sliver of the community turned out. Glaringly absent, were key members of the so-called Muslim leadership. It appears that our moral compass is in tatters and our priorities are skewed.

Our religion insists that we be witnesses to the truth. That is not a slogan, it is an imperative that goes to the core of our identity as people of faith.

What example are we showing our children and grandchildren when we refuse to demonstrate our solidarity with millions of Palestinians who have suffered 76 years of occupation, colonisation and imperialism and who are now facing annihilation?

Have we become like the person from Iraq who dared to ask the learned companion of Prophet Muhammad, Abdullah ibn Umar, about the legal ruling of mosquitoes' blood getting on one's garment? And although the question was valid and Ibn Umar was qualified to answer it, his response elevated the spilling of Muslim blood at Karbala in what is today's Iraq over the blood of a mosquito.

If Muslim leaders refuse to unite around what is so evidently a catastrophic genocide that is unfolding before the eyes of the international community, how can we expect our Christian, Hindu and Rastafarian brothers and sisters to stand shoulder to shoulder with us?

The reality of this genocide is glaringly manifest. No amount of 'barefaced' lies can hide what people are facing at the hands of the Israeli Occupation Force (IDF). Israeli officials go on CNN and the BBC to say that their war in Gaza is aimed at freeing hostages and destroying Hamas. It is an audacious lie repeated to pacify the ill-in-

formed. There is a deep inclination to believe there are untruths in statements made by Benjamin Netanyahu, especially when he repeatedly spoke about Hamas' sexual assault of women, the mass killing of babies, killing a holocaust survivor and other horrendous atrocities his government claims to have taken place on October 7 in order to 'sell their war' on Gaza, a Gaza (and West Bank) that did not appear on a map showing Netanyahu's "new Israel" which he proudly displayed at the United Nations two weeks before October 7

But Netanyahu knows there are loads of eager buyers and sellers of his war in the American political and entertainment industry.

Reputable media outlets that had once reported Israel's falsehoods as truths are only now beginning to fact-check the IDF and Israeli officials. But 'Bibi' Netanyahu is banking on how much tolerance many Americans have for liars.

According to the Washington Post, former President Donald Trump told 30,573 lies during his four years in office and yet he stands a good chance of being re-elected to the Oval Office. Netanyahu, the leader of Israel amidst this evil genocide, is fond of often repeating his favourite mantra that "our war is your war."

Those who showed up on Sunday's March are sending him and his war machine a clear message – THIS IS NOT OUR WAR!

Israel continues to imprison 7,000 Palestinian men, women and children in contravention of all international norms and standards. While the international media gazes in stupendous awe at the destruction in Gaza, armed Jewish settlers have staged 600 vicious attacks against Palestinian villages in the West Bank since October 7, while the IDF stood by and did nothing. Truth is relative, facts are irrefutable: A response to Vincent Alexander

REFERENCE is made to a sitting Commissioner at the Guyana Elections Commission (GECOM), Mr. Vincent Alexander's letter to the editor published on March 7, 2024, with the caption, "... GECOM Commissioner sounds alarm over bloated list ahead of 2025 poll".

The Commissioner contends that the list produced by GECOM of some 706,439 voters will soon exceed the resident population of Guyana. Basing his analysis on the estimated school age population of 200,000, the Commissioner argued that the "voting population should be 580,000, which means the voters list exceeds the resident population by no less than 126,439."

In an attempt to further bolster his argument, the Commissioner contends that there is no mechanism in place to remove deceased persons from the list who are residing abroad, that this is an unremedied flaw in the system. As such, his proposal to remedy this alleged flaw is for the introduction of biometrics.

The opposition nominated GECOM Commissioner's foregoing assertions on the "bloated" voters' list, ignored multiple irrefutable facts to the contrary as outlined hereunder.

The Representation of the People Act (Cap. 1:03) was amended to cater for cycles of continuous registration in 2005. The enactment of this amendment effectively replaced the need for "fresh" house to house (HTH) registration exercise each time there is general and regional elections. Hence, the reason why GECOM has regional offices across the country.

Consequently, the registration system became more efficient and reduced substantially, the cost incurred for periodic HTH. Following this amendment, GECOM conducted eight cycles of continuous registration up to 2016.

The electoral laws provide for the protection of Guyanese rights to vote in an election, who have migrated provided that they are in the country and have been registered. Therefore, Guyanese living abroad cannot be legally or constitutionally removed from the NRR.

In fact, there was a High Court ruling on this matter by the Chief Justice (ag), which resulted in the abortion of the last attempt to conduct a fresh HTH

by the APNU+AFC Government. This number of arrival was reportedly was acknowledged by the Commissioner in his missive.

As it pertains to the removal of dead persons on the voters' list, there is a mechanism in place whereby the General Register Office (GRO), periodically supply GECOM with a list of persons who died. The deceased persons as per the said report are then flagged in the NRR, who are then excluded from the voters' list, which is extracted from the NRR.

Additionally, during the claims and objections period, the general public, including political parties can submit claims or objections to persons on the voters' list who may have passed away or should otherwise be disqualified in accordance with the Constitution. The GECOM Commissioner is full well aware of this procedure, which is actively in place.

Of interest to note, according to the Bureau of Statistics data on the total number of deceased persons for the period 2009-2022, a total of 70,680 persons died during that period (14 years), which accounted for 9 per cent the population. The number of deaths in 2009 was reportedly 3,849 which increased to 6,818 (77 per cent) in 2022, with an annual average of 5,049 deaths over that

In respect of Guyanese residing abroad who might have been in the country and voted at the general and regional elections, this deduction can be made easily by examining the immigration data. For example, in 2015 the total arrivals in the country was reportedly 277,906 and departures were 282,394, giving rise to a net departure for that vear of 4.488 persons.

It is safe to presume that at least 70 per cent of visitors to Guyana are Guyanese. Therefore, it would be correct to say that no less 195,000 Guyanese returned home in 2015, and some of whom might have participated in the 2015 elections. Similarly, in 2020, owing to the lockdown due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the total arrivals in that year was reportedly 105,138 and total departures of 99,821, giving rise to a net arrival of 5,317 persons.

In the year prior (2019), the total

357,362 and total departure of 322,294, giving rise to a net arrival of 35,068.

Assuming that the net arrival in 2019 remained in 2020 for the elections; it would be safe to presume that at least 100,000 overseas-based Guyanese were in Guyana, some of whom might have voted in the 2020 general and regional elections legally. It could be a relatively small percentage, modest or large percentage of the total arrivals for the respective years.

The aforementioned demonstration is a fact that cannot be disputed—that is, tens of thousands of Guyanese residing abroad were in the country during the election period.

In relation to the Commissioner's contention regarding persons who died abroad, he failed to consider that his proposed solution of biometrics would still not address the issue of their removal from the voters' list, which is his main

It is worth noting that the current system in place is an extremely stringent voting procedure that it is nearly impossible for there to be voters' fraud. For instance, the level of scrutiny, inter alia, the voters' verification and/or identification process is very stringent.

Towards that end, at each polling station on election day, there are several representatives including from all the political parties, scrutineers, supervisors, GECOM staff, and observers present at the time of voting. With this in mind, perhaps the only way for there to be a successful "voter impersonation" fraud, would require that all and sundry (the political parties included) to be complicit in facilitating such an act.

More importantly, it is worth reminding that when the political opposition won the parliamentary majority in 2011, there was no such claim that the voters' list was bloated. In 2015, when the then opposition won the general and regional elections, there was no such claim of a bloated list.

Even in the 2020 elections, up to on the election day, the APNU+AFC made no such claim. The claims of a bloated list surfaced after the APNU+AFC realised that they had lost the elections and were viciously attempting to alter the re-

In view of the foregoing, the GECOM Commissioner has failed to credibly demonstrate that the voters' list is bloated, while ignoring a number of critical irrefutable facts.

On the issue of biometrics, the Commissioner has failed to acknowledge that biometrics cannot be introduced in a whimsical manner. For there to be any amendment or the introduction of a new procedure and/or technology for voting purposes, the electoral laws would have to be amended accordingly.

Furthermore, it is likely, too, that the Constitution may have to be amended, which necessitates a different procedure altogether to accommodate any such constitutional and/or legal amendments or reform to the electoral system.

Mass murder in Ottawa: cops admit to errors in communication

Last week, the Ottawa Police acknowledged errors in their communication regarding the recent tragic mass killing, the worst in the city's recent history. The incident, which took place on March 6 in a townhouse in Barrhaven, resulted in the deaths of six individuals, including a mother, her four young children, and a family acquaintance. The woman's husband, and father of the children, is currently hospitalized. A 19year-old man, residing with the family, is in custody, facing six counts of firstdegree murder and one count of attempted murder.

Police received calls at 10:52 p.m. on Wednesday and responded within minutes. However, their subsequent communication missteps drew criticism. The Ottawa Police Service (OPS) initially referred to the incident as a "mass shooting," despite no firearms being involved. Furthermore, they repeatedly misspelled the victims' names and initially misidentified the accused.

During a live interview on CBC, OPS Chief Eric Stubbs erroneously labeled the incident a "mass shooting." At a news conference later that day, Stubbs misidentified the suspect as "Frank D'-Souza." The actual suspect, Febrio De-Zoysa, a 19-year-old Sri Lankan national studying in Canada, was officially charged.

In response to these errors, OPS is-

sued multiple correction emails, each containing new mistakes. The police admitted the challenges of investigating complex homicide cases with rapidly evolving information. They cited "multiple credible sources" contributing to misinformation and acknowledged the inherent risks in fast-paced communica-

Experts, such as Christopher Schneider from Brandon University and Darryl Davies from Carleton University, criticized the police's communication, emphasizing its impact on public perception. Schneider highlighted the potential erosion of confidence and trust in policing, especially within immigrant, refugee, and racialized communities. Davies acknowledged the tremendous pressure faced by first responders at the crime scene but stressed the need for better training in effectively communicating details of such tragedies to the public.

"That probably contributed to the lack of information and consistency of information that subsequently came out," Davies said, noting their priority would be locating victims and hunting for the suspect.

"They were probably, understandably, totally caught off guard, and the shock and the horror of witnessing something like that would have unbelievable ramifications on the individuals who are there."

Davies said that trauma "probably more than anything overshadowed any consistency or communication to the public, because it would have just been so horrific."

He said even officers prepared with the best possible training would face a "horrific challenge" just trying to process the information.

"The Ottawa police did the best they could under the circumstances, given the horrific nature of the events and how they unfolded."

But Davies also said police need better training in communicating the details of such tragedies to the public.

"Police as a whole need to have people who are specialized in communications. I think they should be trained in how to deal with these situations."

Guyana's banking, finance sector standing on solid foundation

THE finance and banking sector is no longer standing on a shaky foundation due to the careful and prudent management of the economy, coupled with strategic planning being undertaken by the People's Progressive Party/Civic (PPP/C) government, according to President Dr. Irfaan Ali.

During the official opening of the \$1.2 billion Republic Bank Williams-burg Branch at Rose Hall, Region Six (East Berbice-Corentyne), Dr. Ali affirmed that the region is no longer starved of development, as was the case under the former A Partnership for National Unity +Alliance For Change (APNU+AFC) government.

While addressing the large gathering, he said: "Our banking sector is on solid grounds; our financial sector is on solid grounds," underscoring the need for modernisation.

The Head of State added: "Any investor, any member of the private sector that invests in this region, you are making an economic and financial decision that is wise and prudent."

Sparing no effort to slam detractors of development, who, according to him, "can never see anything good," President Ali used statistics to support his argument that the private sector is now viable.

He pointed out that among some of the major increases, real estate mortgage loans showed an increase of 22 per cent, credit to agriculture grew by 14.4 per cent, credit to real estate grew by 22.5 per cent, and mining and quarry grew by 18 per cent.

Additionally, investments by the banks increased by 20.8 per cent to \$299 billion, according to President Ali. He added that out of the \$299 billion, 68.7 per cent of that total investment was from local investors.

"Results are what matter," the Head of State related, adding that progress aside, banking has to be transformed and modernised.

He said that banking should extend beyond accounting transactions to investment transactions, and in order to achieve this the banking sector must deploy its human capital to enhance productive use.

Notably, the banking sector's return on equity at the end of 2023 was 15.1 per cent, while the return on assets was two per cent.

Highlighting the positive outlook that the new branch of the bank will offer, Group President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of Republic Financial Holdings Limited, Nigel Baptiste said customers will enjoy an "enhanced banking experience," within the 14,755 square foot accommodation.

"We've also increased our in-

branch banking options, and customers who register for our Internet banking service can access that service, besides from their homes, from a dedicated terminal in the banking hall," Baptiste said.

As the PPP/C Government continues to work assiduously to ensure that development reaches every square inch of Guyana, President Ali did not shy away from highlighting that the region is being positioned in a critical manner.

For instance, he pointed out
**how the US\$7 million Hospitality
and Tourism Training Institute at Port
Mourant, in Region Six will play an integral role in human transformation.

"The new hospital that we're building in New Amsterdam will be a new teaching hospital and with the University of West Indies. We are now discussing a medical school that will be attached to that hospital...That is the type of investment we are making to facilitate the human resource transformation and building up of opportunities for human resource assets," Dr. Ali said.

He also noted that before the end of this year, the gas strategy and gas development plan will be outlined, and Region Six will be an integral part of that development.

Dr. Ali then went on to say:
"There is no other country in this region, in Latin America [and the]
Caribbean region, and don't let anyone fool you, that is approaching development in such a holistic and futuristic

manner."

Moreover, as he blasted detractors of development for their continuous lack of positivity, the President said: "When you look at their comments, they can never see anything good, they can never see anything progressive.... They will never speak about these things that will transform this region that will bring this region ahead of time."

Dr Ali said that the government has been investing to ensure that the lives of all Guyanese are improved and this is being done through systemic development.

"And the type of success that the banking sector is enjoying today is not accidental," he said while challenging naysayers to analyse performance in 2019.

President Ali then went on to say: "That is because the economy is performing better, and creating better opportunities for people to be integrated into financial services...that is not accidental. That is by careful, prudent management and planning by government that understands what it is doing."



Women Judges to conduct womenwith-babies-in-prison survey

AS the world observed International Day of Women Judges on Sunday, the Guyana Association of Women Judges (GAWJ) has announced that it will be conducting a survey on women with babies in the country's prison system.

This is according to a media release from the association, which noted that this project comes in light of the theme for the year's observance, "Empathy and Action: Women and girls in carceral settings."

To this end, the GAWJ noted that the discussion will be centred on the question, "What happens when the prisoner is also a mother?" and is intended to address the pregnant women who give birth to babies while in prison.

In this regard, the release added that the treatment of pregnant women who are incarcerated and give birth while serving a sentence in Guyana is provided for in the Prisons Act, Chapter 11:01 section 240.

"A female prisoner may have her baby with her during the baby's normal period of lactation and longer (to a maximum of 12 months) if required in special circumstances, and the baby may be supplied with clothing and necessaries at the public expense," the act states.

It was noted that an inquiry to the prison authority in relation to the treatment of pregnant mothers who give birth to babies while in prison in Guyana revealed that there are robust standard operating procedures in this regard.

These procedures include provisions for prenatal care for the prisoner throughout the entire duration of the pregnancy and also post-natal care for the mother, along with specific care for

the baby after delivery.

"In light of the theme of the IAWJ for 2024, the GAWJ will embark on a joint project with non-governmental organisations to conduct a practical survey of women with babies in prison in Guyana," the release added.

This project will seek to ascertain whether the legislative measures are adequate and would address the psychosocial support that is offered to the mothers. It is also intended to determine what practical and meaningful interventions can be made to improve the conditions of women.

The release said: "The Guyana Association of Women Judges reaffirms its commitment to supporting the role of the IAWJ. It is focused on the goal of promoting a greater understanding and better resolution of legal issues facing women and girls."














Health Ministry responds to 'false information' published in Guyana

In its continuing campaign of disseminating false information and serving the role of an anti-government mouthpiece, the Kaieteur News (KN) published a story on March 10 with patently false information. The Ministry of Health (MOH), therefore, takes this opportunity to correct the false information peddled by the KN.

The KN in its publication reported that the MOH has rented hotel rooms since December 2022, at a cost of almost \$75M for students in training. The MOH has rented rooms from Jaigobin Hotels in Region 2, but the cost stated by KN is not nearly the cost reported in the newspaper. The MOH has rented 11 rooms at a cost of \$1.1M per month and has so far paid \$16.5M. The sum stated in the KN is mischievous and is overstated by about 78%. The MOH is not paying regular rates for these hotel rooms.

When the need arose for renting additional housing space, quotations were obtained from local hotels and facilities and the MOH was able to com-

Since assuming office in August 2020, the PPP Government has been transforming the health sector. In addition to the massive physical and techinfrastructure nological significantly expanded package of service across the country, the Ministry of

plete satisfactory arrangements with Health and the Government of Guyana, working with the Public Service Ministry, the Ministry of Local Government, the GPHC and the ten Regional Health Services Department in the RDCs have been implementing an aggressive human resource for health (HRH) development program.

> The training program includes training at the highest levels, such as specialist doctors and nurses and management and leadership programs to provide support for several allied health areas. Not only are these training programmes conducted centrally in Georgetown at GPHC and the Nursing Schools in Georgetown, New Amsterdam and Linden, but a number of the allied health training are now conducted at the local level with instructors from Georgetown, other regions and from the local training centre areas.

In Region 2, a number of on-site, locally conducted training programs started in 2022. In December 2022, arrangements were made to train 22 pharmacy assistants to help support the Region 2 pharmacy service, including at Suddie and Charity Hospitals. These 22 pharmacy assistants have since graduated. There are presently 48 nursing assistants, 19 post-basic midwifery and 22 laboratory assistant students in training in Region 2 presently. Among the students in the Region 2-located training programs are also students from Re-

Similar programmes are being done in all regions.

These locally-conducted training programs are in addition to the cen-

trally-conducted programs, such as the 1,200 students registered in the centrally-led hybrid programs for registered nurses and nursing assistants, more than 250 post-graduate specialist residency training at GPHC and several dozen being trained online through international universities. These training programs do not include students presently studying abroad. While the MOH has expanded the traditional training programs, there are also new programs that have been added and that are coming on stream.

Clearly, some of these training programs require the MOH and the local health departments to provide housing for students who come from distant places. In the case of Region 2, some of these students are accommodated at the Jaigobin Hotel facilities at a considerably reduced cost that the MOH negotiated.

It is noteworthy that at present in the Suddie Hospital Compound, a new training centre is being constructed that would provide classroom and dormitory accommodation for the students who are being trained in Region 2. Construction is due to be completed in Quarter 1 of 2025.

The MOH could not wait until construction was completed and, therefore, embarked on renting facilities to accommodate those students who require local accommodation.

Outside of ensuring that the health sector benefits from improved and expanded human resources for health, the program also empowers young people with skills and employment.



Caribbean Investment Forum set for July in Georgetown

PREPARATIONS are underway for Guyana to host this year's Caribbean Investment Forum which is expected to be held from July 10 to July 12 at the Arthur Chung Conference Centre.

According to the official website, this year's forum is set to focus on sustainable agriculture, green economy transition and the digitalisation of business. As such the forum has put out an official call for large projects with national or regional impact that requires large capital investments in these areas.

The forum is said to be one of the largest gatherings of business people in the Caribbean region and is focused on promoting investments across the region in various sectors.

Recently, several members of the Caribbean Export Development Agency which spearheads the forum, visited Guyana and met with government officials and members of the private sector.

In February, the Executive Director, Deodat Maharaj met with President Dr Irfaan Ali who confirmed the government's partnership in hosting the premier regional forum which brings investors and businesses together to broker deals to foster re-

gional transformation.

Further to this, Maharaj after that high-level meeting, indicated that the agency is excited to showcase sustainable agriculture investment opportunities and innovation in the heart of the Caribbean's breadbasket.

During that time, they also met with Guyana's Chief Investment Officer, Dr Peter Ramsaroop who also expressed support for the advancement of the initiative in the region.

Late last week, senior officials from CEDA also met with executives


of the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce and Industry (GCCI) and discussed participation and collaboration.

'We will never allow the evil forces to take the soul of our country'

International community must recognize suffering of Palestinians: VP

ACKNOWLEDGING the sufferings and violence in Gaza, Vice-President Dr. Bharrat Jagdeo has said that Palestinians are starving because of the "failure" of the international community to come together and recognise what is going on.

His call comes at a time when Muslims across the world are observing the Holy Month of Ramadan, a period of fasting, prayer and reflection.

In his address at the launch of the first-ever local Ramadan Village on the lawns of the Muslim Youth Organisation (MYO) ground, Dr. Jagdeo said: "Ramadan is a period of fasting and sacrifice. There is a part of the world where people are fasting involuntarily; I'm speaking about Gaza....

"Now we have tens of thousands of people in Gaza who are starving; and they are not starving because there is no food in the world, they are starving because of the failure of the international community to come together and recognise the suffering of the Palestinian people."

Amidst the colourful décor at the Ramadan Village, many booths proudly showcased the sign, "Free Palestine", and the respective exhibitors were enthusiastic about showcasing numerous aspects of the teachings of Islam along with garments, literature, local and international cuisine, including sweetmeats.

Amplifying the messages that were around, Dr. Jagdeo called out Israel for its continuous crimes against Palestine, and noted that prevarication around this issue has allowed Israel to defy the entire international community.

He said: "Israel cannot bring security to itself through wiping out the Palestinian people. And that is why we support a two-State solution to this issue; the entire world supports a two-State solution to bring peace to that region to allow Israel to live in peace and security, but also the Palestinian people to live in dignity."

Given the devastating situation in Gaza, the Vice-President said that Guyanese have to count their blessings, because they live in a country that is culturally, religiously and ethnically diverse.

He also firmly remarked that the People's Progressive Party (PPP) Government is steadfast in its efforts to unite all citizens.

"President Irfaan Ali recognises that the economic and social prosperity that is taking place in our country has to be buttressed by support for cultural diversity, and for things spiritual, because our nation will be incomplete if we only focus on those issues," he said, adding

that the Head of State, since assuming office, has extended his support to various cultural groups and religious communities.

"He doesn't believe that there is a single culture in Guyana, we [the PPP] believe that we must allow all of our people to feel comfortable with who they are," Dr. Jagdeo said.

Hack said: "This nourishment of the soul produces good thoughts, positivity, peace of mind, and strengthens our forbearance. We are humans because of a body and the soul. And through this fast, we are able to preserve our humanity."



US, Caribbean lead multinational team in support of Haiti

WITH gangs now ruling Haiti's capital Port Au Prince, Caribbean Community (CARICOM) leaders have announced that multinational security support is being mobilised to assist Haitian authorities in restoring law and order.

On Monday, CARICOM's Chairperson and Guyana's President Dr. Irfaan Ali lead a multi-stakeholder meeting with both regional and international partners in Kingston, Jamaica.

After hours of intense meetings and discussions, Dr. Ali, during a press briefing, said that CARICOM's 'singular and primary concern' remains the citizens of Haiti.

"We have held deep and honest discussions with our Haitian brothers and sisters who represent the political and civil society and faith-based leaders of the Haitian people, to attempt to arrive at the consensus around an effective, inclusive, transitional government structure to take country to general elections in the shortest possible time," the Guyanese Head of State said.

Over the last few weeks, CARI-COM leaders have been engaged in deep discussions with stakeholders in Haiti and across the region, following intensified waves of violence in the sister state.

"...We must all reach a consensus among ourselves and our support for the Haitian people, the difficult decisions we make here today would have to be in the interest of the Haitian people and we must be clear sighted, strategic and laser focused on acting on their interest," Dr Ali said while stressing that talks have not been easy.

The CARICOM Chair further noted that emphasis must not only be placed on an immediate solution, but also on the need for 'building blocks' for political stability and the long-term recovery and development of the coun-

According to international news reports, heavily armed gangs attempted to take over Haiti's main international airport, exchanging gunfire with police and soldiers in the most recent attack on important government locations in a wave of violence that also included a

mass escape from the nation's two largest prisons.

They wanted to stop 74-year-old Haitian Prime Minister, Ariel Henry from returning from his trip to Kenya, where he had travelled to in order to sign an agreement on the deployment of a multinational police force to the Caribbean island.

Henry had travelled to Kenya after attending the CARICOM summit.

The CARICOM country is still experiencing an upsurge in violence and tional security support, Jamaica's Prime Minster Andrew Holness disclosed, while addressing the news briefing.

According to Holness, Haiti needs new cohesive domestic resolve, and the support of its partners.

"The people of Haiti deserve the opportunity to experience another way of being, to determine their destiny, to secure their rights and to be free from oppressive forces within and without." Holness said.
