New US\$262M Harbour Bridge opens, named for Bharrat Jagdeo

As the day closed on October 5, seven aircrafts of the Guyana Defence Force flew past Guyana's newest bridge as it was commissioned in Demerara, Guyana.

Replacing the Demerara Harbour Bridge which stood above the Demerara River for 47 years, the US\$262M bridge was officially commissioned as the Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge. Named after former president and current Vice President, Dr Bharrat Jagdeo, in honour of his years of service and dedication to the upliftment of Guyana and its people.

Speaking at the commissioning, Guyana's President Dr Irfaan Ali said, "As President... It is my honour, my privilege, and indeed my duty, to dedicate this bridge in the name of Bharrat Jagdeo. From this day forward, it shall be called the Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge, because great men deserve recognition, because visionaries deserve legacies, and because Guyana never forgets its giants."



Hegseth says he has every authorisation needed for Caribbean strikes

U.S. Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth said he has every authorisation needed for U.S. military strikes on vessels just off the coast of Venezuela allegedly carrying illegal drugs.

Hegseth was speaking in a Fox News interview broadcast on Sunday.

The United States killed four people in a strike in the Caribbean Sea on Friday, at least the fourth such attack in recent weeks. "We have every authorisation needed. These are designated as foreign terrorist organisations," Hegseth said in an interview on Fox News' "The Sunday Briefing."

He did not provide more details about the authorisation. Washington has cited the U.S. Constitution, war powers, designation of drug cartels as foreign terrorist organisations, the right to self-defense and international law on unlawful combatants as the legal basis for the strikes.

Legal experts and some lawmakers argue that using military force in international waters against alleged criminals' bypasses due process, violates law enforcement norms, lacks a clear legal foundation under U.S. and international law and is not justified by the cartels' terrorist designation.

Hegseth and President Donald Trump

have not provided evidence for claims that the targeted boats were carrying drugs. Trump told Congress last week that he had determined the U.S. to be in "a non-international armed conflict" with drug cartels, without providing any new legal rationale. Critics say the boat strikes are a further effort by Trump to test the scope of his presidential powers. Legal experts have questioned why the military is carrying out

these attacks rather than the U.S. Coast Guard, the country's maritime law agency.

"If you're in our hemisphere, if you're in the Caribbean, if you're north of Venezuela and you want to traffic drugs to the United States, you are a legitimate target of the United States military," Hegseth said

Trump on Sunday said the U.S. military buildup in the Caribbean had halted

drug trafficking from South America. "There's no drugs coming into the water. And we'll look at what phase two is," he told reporters at the White House. Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov on Sunday told his Venezuelan counterpart that the country condemns the U.S. strikes and is concerned about the dangers of potential U.S. escalation in the Caribbean.

\$14M to procure seine nets for Corentyne

Sixty-six fisherfolk from Albion and Port Mourant on the Corentyne Coast, received seine nets on Saturday to assist with their operations at sea. This intervention represents an investment of just over \$14 million and follows a commitment made by His Excellency President Dr. Irfaan Ali during a meeting with fisherfolk last May.

Agriculture Minister, Hon. Zulfikar Mustapha, met with the fisherfolk to deliver the seine nets on behalf of the Head of State.

While offering remarks, Minister Mustapha stated that each fisherfolk will receive seven bundles of seine.

"When we met with fisherfolk at the Albion Sports Complex, they said they needed help with nets. We've been in constant contact with your representative here, and today, fisherfolk from Albion, and some from Port Mourant, will each receive seven bundles of seine from the government, your government," he said.

Minister Mustapha also assured the fisherfolk that, over time, they will continue to benefit from additional interventions, as the government increases budgetary allocations to the sector. He noted that a number of other initiatives have already been implemented to support fisherfolk since the government took office in 2020.

"We have been increasing budgetary allocations to the sector every year. We've been resuscitating all the fisherfolk organizations. We've been procur-

ing GPS systems so that fishermen can track their boats while at sea. We've also been working with partners both around the country and in neighboring countries to ease piracy. I know that the Guyana Police Force has been working diligently to address that. We've also removed the taxes placed on fishing inputs and made adjustments to the tax structure, making outboard engines of 1,500 horsepower and under duty-free," he explained.

Minister Mustapha further stated that the other agencies within the Ministry will work along with fisherfolk to empower them to supplement their income.

"If you look at our 2025 to 2030

manifesto, you will see that we have a lot of plans for the fisheries sector. We don't want fisherfolk to depend on artisanal fishing alone. We have to diversify the sector. From the ministry's perspective, we are looking to get you involved into additional activities so that you can supplement your income. In the coming months, you'll see officials from the different agencies working along with you to get involved in additional activities so that you can supplement your income.

Dr. Ramcharan Justifies Genocide

Family Remembers Richmond Hill Fire Victim for Her 'Boundless Love and Light'

A 24-year-old woman who died after a devastating house fire in Richmond Hill, ON., is being remembered as a radiant and selfless soul whose compassion and kindness touched everyone she met.

Helya Bahari-Kashani succumbed to her injuries on Sept. 3, two days after an early-morning blaze tore through her family's Skywood Drive home. The fire, which police say was deliberately set, also claimed the life of her 11-year-old niece, Rosa.

Three other family members — Bahari-Kashani's parents and sister — were critically injured but are now slowly recovering, relatives said.

"Helya means the sun, and she truly lived up to her name," her cousin, Melody Yazdi, said.

"She was radiant. Any place she walked into, she just brought so much light and love."

York Regional Police have confirmed they are treating the Sept. 1 fire as a homicide. No arrests have been made. Yazdi described Bahari-Kashani as "the most selfless, compassionate, and empathetic person" she had ever known.

"She had this incredible gift of making everyone feel seen, heard, and safe," she said. "She truly was extraordinary."

Born in Iran, Bahari-Kashani immigrated to Canada with her family as a child and spent most of her life in Richmond Hill.

A graduate of Richmond Hill High

School, she studied for a year at York University before transferring to UCLA, where she recently completed a pre-med degree in psychology, earning several scholarships and awards.

At UCLA, she worked as a research assistant, volunteered at the

David Geffen School of Medicine, and immersed herself in campus life. This summer, she returned home to study for her medical school entrance exam, planning to continue her studies in the U.S. next year.

"Helya had a deep passion for

medicine — for helping people and saving lives. That's all she ever wanted to do," Yazdi said. Though her dream of becoming a doctor was cut short, Bahari-Kashani's generosity lives on. Her organs were donated to help up to 75 people.

Thieves steal \$85K in booze

Four suspects have been arrested in relation to the theft of more than \$85,000 in alcohol from LCBO stores across the Greater Toronto Area.

Police say the group operated in an organized fashion and are responsible for a total of 54 thefts from LCBO locations since May.

Investigators say that the group also committed thefts at other major retailers, including hardware, dollar, grocery, and thrift stores.

Halton police arrested four suspects in Oakville on Oct. 1 in a joint action with the LCBO's Resource Protection Unit.

A search of their vehicle resulted in the seizure of a quantity of illicit drugs, including cocaine, MDMA and Hydromorphon. Christopher Noel, 39, Crystal King, 40, Philip Young 48, and Marc Martiniello, 33, all of Mississauga, face a total of 24 combined charges.

The charges have not yet been tested in court. Police say that all four suspects were under various release orders pertaining to past theft-related charges at the time of their arrest, including one who was bound by eight separate release orders.

"HRPS emphasize that retail theft is not a victimless crime. The theft of goods from retail stores impacts all Ontarians through increased prices and compromised safety in retail environments. The rise in organized retail crime continues to pose risks to both retail workers and customers," a news release issued by Halton Regional Police states.

'Guyana ready to claim its place in the 21st century world economy'


SIGNALLING Guyana's ambition to assert itself as a modern, forward-looking player on the global stage, President, Dr Irfaan Ali has said that this nation is ready to claim its position in a 21st century economy.

The Head of State while addressing thousands of excited Guyanese, government officials and special invitees at the commissioning of the Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge on Sunday, noted that deliberate and strategic investments in super structures such as the new bridge will propel the country's economy.

"Infrastructure is not merely a physical structure. Infrastructure is also a statement. It is a signal to the world that a nation is ready. And this bridge speaks loudly, declaring Guyana is ready! Ready to modernise, ready to industrialise, ready to claim its place in the 21st century world economy," the President said.

Guyana has been pumping the revenues it has earned from its oil resources, making tangible investments in building new highways, bridges, schools and health facilities.

Aside from the newly commissioned Demerara River crossing, President Ali had announced a few days prior that construction works on a new Berbice River bridge are expected to

commence this year.

In addition to a new Berbice bridge, works on the new Kurupukari Bridge could start soon, and, once completed, it will replace the pontoon crossing for the Kurupukari River along the Linden/Lethem Trail.

Additionally, the President had stated that the ongoing construction of the US\$35 million Mackenzie-Wismar Bridge is just over 72 per cent complete.

The works are being executed by China Railway Construction Corporation Limited and include the construction of a four-lane, 220-metre-long precast concrete bridge outfitted with essential safety features such as lighting and sidewalks.

The bridge will replace the current structure that spans the Demerara River in Region 10 (Upper Demerara-Upper Berbice).

In addition to the foregoing projects, several massive highways are under construction to enhance greater inter-regional linkages.

One notable road project is the expansion of the East Coast road along the railway embankment that is now 77 per cent complete. "Oil revenues, wisely managed, are being converted into structures like this, projects that deliver benefits to every Guyanese. This bridge is proof that our resources are not squandered. They are reinvested into the future, long future of the people of our

country," President Ali said on Sunday.

During his inauguration speech back in September, he said that the first six weeks of his second term in office will see the groundwork being laid for a sweeping range of infrastructural and economic projects aimed at accelerating national development, job creation and regional integration.

He had stressed then that the country's economic future depends not only on the ambitions and policies of the government, but also on the private sector, which is ready to drive wealth and job creation. He explained further that collaboration between the private sector and the government will propel shared prosperity.

Guyana, China to continue collaboration on development

CHINA and Guyana are set to deepen their long-standing partnership with China opening its door wider to Guyana, offering new opportunities in infrastructure, manufacturing, telecommunication, and sustainable development, which would accelerate economic growth.

These were sentiments voiced by China's Ambassador to Guyana, Yang Yang, in an exclusive interview with the Sunday Chronicle. China is signalling a stronger partnership with Guyana as it reaffirms its commitment to a fair and open global trading system, the Ambassador noted.

At the 80th Session of the United Nations General Assembly, China's Premier, Li Qiang highlighted China's dedication to multilateralism amid global trade challenges, and he declared that China, as a major developing country, will not seek new special and differential treatment in World Trade Organisation (WTO) negotiations—a move seen as a powerful endorsement of open, rules-based trade.

"China will always stand with other developing countries," he said, adding: "Our door is open wider than ever for trade and investment cooperation."

Ambassador Yang reflected on these sentiments and stated, "For Guyana, this represents exciting opportunities. China has become one of the country's most important trade and economic partners in the Caribbean.

"Both nations are actively exploring collaboration in manufacturing, infrastructure, telecommunications, finance, and green development. The goal is to reduce trade barriers, deepen practical cooperation, and create sustainable growth that benefits both countries."

Bilateral trade between Guyana and China has expanded significantly in recent years, reaching an all-time high of approximately US\$1.4 billion in 2024.

"The traditional friendship between our two countries has stood the test of time, and continues to grow stronger, with friendly exchanges and cooperation in various fields deepening and yielding solid results. Building a China-Guyana community with a shared future reflects our shared aspiration for a bright future," she said

The ambassador described the relationship as "a ship sailing forward", steered by political trust, anchored in cooperation, and propelled by cultural exchange and multilateralism.

Recent high-level engagements, including a meeting between President Dr. Irfaan Ali and President Xi Jinping in 2023, as well as talks between Foreign Ministers Wang Yi and Hugh Todd earlier this year, have outlined new areas of collaboration

Ford Threatens to Pull Crown Royal from LCBO Shelves Over Planned Plant Closure

Ontario Premier Doug Ford is threatening to ban Crown Royal whisky from the province's liquor stores if its parent company, Diageo, goes ahead with plans to close a nearly century-old bottling plant in Amherstburg, ON.

Speaking at a union rally in Brampton on Saturday, Ford vowed to fight for the roughly 200 workers who stand to lose their jobs when the southwestern Ontario facility shuts down next year.

"A message to all the bigwigs at Diageo: I swear to God, those bottles of Crown Royal are coming off the LCBO shelves," Ford told a cheering crowd. "When the last person walks out that door, we're going to make sure LCBO takes their brands off the shelves — because we need to stick together."

Ford's remarks were his strongest yet on the issue since Diageo announced in August that it would close the Amherstburg facility, which has operated for nearly 100 years.

In early September, Ford made headlines by dumping a bottle of Crown Royal during a press conference, calling Diageo "dumb as a bag of hammers" for its decision.

"You hurt my people, I'm gonna hurt you," Ford said at the time. "You're gonna feel the pain in February when these people don't have a paycheque."

While Ford stopped short then of promising to pull Crown Royal from the LCBO, his latest comments suggest that option is now firmly on the table — a move long demanded by the union representing the plant's workers.

Diageo, the U.K.-based multinational behind brands such as Guinness, Smirnoff, and Captain Morgan, has defended its decision as part of a plan "to increase the efficiency and resiliency" of its supply chain. The company says it intends to shift some bottling closer to its U.S. customers but insists that Crown Royal will continue to be mashed, distilled, and aged in Canada "just as it has been since 1939."

Unifor Local 200 president John D'Agnolo said Monday that the province should act immediately and remove Diageo's products from store shelves, not wait until the plant's closure in February.



"I think it's important that the impact happens quickly — and very costly," D'Agnolo said. "They'd change their mind. We've seen that time and time again."

He added that he believes Diageo would reopen talks if it started losing revenue in Ontario.

"The amount of money they'd lose within a two- or three-month period would be unbelievable," he said.

Unifor National President Lana Payne has also urged the government to take strong action, arguing that only a major financial hit will push Diageo to reconsider.

Ford's office did not clarify whether the LCBO ban would extend to all Diageo products or when it might take effect. A spokesperson for the premier, Hannah Jensen, said only that "unless Diageo reverses their decision to close their Amherstburg plant, all options remain on the table."

Diageo, for its part, reiterated its earlier statements, saying the decision "was not taken lightly" and that it will work with Unifor to support affected employees.

The Diageo facility in Amherstburg

"We will support all impacted employees through this transition," the company said in a statement. "We will follow the requirements of our collec-

tive agreement and the law, and engage with the community to find meaningful ways to provide support."

Suspect wanted in seven shootings around the GTA: cops

Police say that an Innisfil man is facing charges in connection with seven shooting incidents that took place at residences across the Greater Toronto Area and in London this past summer.

The shootings took place between Aug. 18 and Sept. 10 in Brampton, Vaughan and London.

Police say that investigators believe the suspect fired a combined 125 shots during the incidents.

There were no injuries reported as a result of any of the shootings.

The suspect was arrested in the early morning hours of Sept. 10 after police responded to a call for the sounds of gunshots near Bathurst Street and Teston Road in Vaughan.

"Officers responded quickly and attempted to contain the suspect vehicle. After a short foot pursuit, the suspect was arrested with the assistance of the canine unit," a news release issued on Tuesday morning notes.

Police say that the suspect was initially charged with offences related to the Sept. 10 shooting and has since been "linked" to the other shooting incidents.

Kaejean Isaiah Doman, 23, is now facing an additional six counts of discharging a firearm with intent and an additional six counts of possessing a prohibited or restricted firearm, police say.

Police say that Doman has remained in custody since his Sept. 10 arrest. The charges against him have not been tested in court.

"Investigators are appealing to anyone who have may video surveillance or dash cam footage from the areas at the time of the shootings to please come forward," police said in the news release.

In a meaningful engagement with the employees, some of whom have over 20 years of experience under their belt, President Ali thanked them for their service to Guyana – even before the ribbon is cut today to usher in the new era of connectivity. From the welders to the engineers and those who worked the toll booths, the president commended them for their hard work throughout the years to keep the old Demerara Harbour Bridge operational.

"That was no ordinary task... As president and as a government, we appreciate you. We recognise the tremendous work that you have done, and I do not want you to believe that this new bridge displaces your work or your contribution," he said.

The president assured the employees that they will not lose out on their level of salary or benefits.

"Your service will continue and you will grow with the new opportunities that will come your way."

Highlighting the government's sustained investment in national infrastructure, President Ali noted that the

affected employees will continue to play a role in Guyana's development, with many now contributing in a more permanent capacity.

Meanwhile, Minister of Public Works, Juan Edghill, stated that discussions have already begun and emphasised that the employees possess valuable skills that can be applied across various sectors. He assured that the ministry will continue to operate in full compliance with the law to safeguard the welfare and rights of all workers.

The new Demerara River Bridge is set to be commissioned today, marking another milestone in the country's infrastructure drive. The new US\$260 million facility was constructed by China Railway Construction Corporation Limited and represents one of the most transformative infrastructure

projects in Guyana's modern history.

Spanning 2.6 kilometres, it will link Region 3 and Region 4, providing round-the-clock, toll-free access.

The four-lane, cable-stayed structure is designed to last 100 years and accommodate vehicles of all sizes, travelling at up to 80 kilometres per hour. Once operational, it is expected to benefit over 50,000 commuters daily and deliver an estimated \$3.5 billion in annual savings by eliminating toll fees and reducing fuel consumption and travel time.

Beyond its function as a vital transportation artery, the Demerara River Bridge, with its illuminated Cacique Crown of Honour towers, will stand as both a symbol of national pride and a marker of Guyana's rapid infrastructural transformation.

Three months in...Enmore Regional Hospital already making an impact

ADVANCING access to quality, affordable healthcare is one of the many goals of the Government of Guyana.

In July this year, the President, alongside the Minister of Health, commissioned the Enmore Regional Hospital, with the aim of bringing healthcare closer to those persons in the community who need it and decreasing travel time.

The Enmore Regional Hospital, like the others, provides a first-class experience to its visitors, with 24-hour service in the accident and emergency department, a radiology department that does ultrasounds, x-rays and CT scans, outpatient services, and specialised clinics that are open Monday to Friday, just to name a few. These services and many others are free of cost.

Since its opening in July, the hospital has seen more than 7,000 patients in the outpatient department, and almost 5,000 in the accident and emergency department. Thus far, 85 babies have been delivered at the hospital.

This was stated by the Medical Superintendent at the Hospital, Dr. Tracey Bovell on a recent episode of 'Health Matters'.

She said: "We have a lot of specialists. We have, as I would have mentioned, all of the different specialties that we have. But we also have midwives. We have for nursing. We have our RNs. We have NAs and PCAs. And we're growing."

Because it is a young hospital still, Dr. Bovell said the Enmore facility is partnering with the Georgetown Public Hospital Corporation (GPHC) to train staff, increasing their skills and capacity

to treat critically ill patients. Additionally, the Enmore Regional Hospital is also partnering with the new Diamond Regional Hospital, Bath Regional Hospital and De Kinderen Regional Hospital

Speaking on the impact the hospital has had on the community, Dr. Bovell stated, "So the community is welcoming

us with open arms; they are happy to have a specialised hospital so close by. They're actually coming to the hospital, being provided with care, and they're getting to know the physicians even better, and checking in with the physicians, even when they don't even need to check in with the physicians."

The Enmore Regional Hospital is

part of a bigger vision of a Guyana where every citizen has access to high-quality, modern and people-centred healthcare, President Dr. Irfaan Ali had said.

The hospital was built in collaboration with China's Sinopharm International, and is part of a broader \$37.2 billion national health transformation across the country.

As I am speaking also, we have already continued to expand in terms of hatching eggs that we had before, but as I said, we will be investing in terms of being self-sufficient in Guyana. That is, we are using approximately \$53 million hatching eggs annually. I am hoping with this project that we are about to launch, that we will surpass that and export to the Caribbean markets."

In 2024 Guyana had tripled its hatching eggs production. Guyana had imported nearly 53 million eggs annually at a cost of over \$350 million.

To reduce this dependency, the country launched a hatching egg production programme in 2023 with a private partnership, resulting in the production of 27,000 eggs last year at the broiler

satisfy the demands of the local market breeder facility on the East Bank corridor. This facility was established to reduce the reliance on imported hatching

> Back in 2022, in response to the large consumption of eggs at the regional level and its constant demand on the market, President Ali had detailed plans for the large-scale poultry hatchery and egg production project at Pakuri Village.

> Meanwhile, the country is rapidly increasing its self-sufficiency in producing corn and soya bean, boosting its capability to produce its own livestock feed locally.

Recently, locally-harvested soybeans were recently transported by vessel, for the first time, from the Tacama drying and storage facility, located approximately 90 miles up the Berbice River, to a processing mill where it will be converted into poultry feed.



Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge opens

Minister Edghill urges motorists to embrace 'Five Cs,' new driving culture

MINISTER of Public Works, Juan Edghill, has urged motorists to adopt a new culture of road use—one grounded in the "Five Cs": care, caution, consideration, common sense, and courtesy—to ensure smooth and safe traffic flow on the newly commissioned Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge.

Speaking at a media briefing on Monday, Minister Edghill said the opening of the state-of-the-art four-lane bridge marks the end of the old habits associated with the aging Demerara Harbour Bridge, including rushing to cross during "double-lane" hours and early morning bottlenecks.

The minister was joined by Traffic Chief Mahendra Singh, several senior traffic officers, General Manager of the Demerara Harbour Bridge Corporation, Wayne Watson, and engineers from the Ministry of Public Works.

The briefing was convened to address the first day of full traffic operations on the new bridge, which was officially commissioned on Sunday by President Dr. Irfaan Ali.

Minister Edghill emphasised that

the new bridge offers continuous, uninterrupted traffic flow in both directions, eliminating the need for previous practices.

"So, nobody needs to rush out of work or leave home early in the morning unnecessarily to go and join the line to cross the bridge. The days for that are over, and that is why we built what is now known as the Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge. Everybody just needs to practise the Five Cs, and everybody will get where they are going."

Minister Edghill explained that the new Bharrat Jagdeo Demerara River Bridge represents more than just an infrastructure upgrade—it demands a shift in public behaviour.

"We have moved from a two-lane bridge to a four-lane bridge," he said. "There will be no stoppages in the morning or afternoon, no priority lanes, and no need for panic. Traffic will flow continuously."

Reiterating that the "old culture" of bridge traffic is now behind Guyanese motorists, the public works minister appealed for co-operation and patience as the nation adjusts to this landmark development.

He said the new bridge symbolises progress, noting that it is faster, safer, and more efficient. He emphasised that this advancement must be matched by a new driving culture built on patience, discipline, and the Five Cs, adding that the bridge will serve the nation well if everyone plays their part.

He noted that the bridge was built the efficiency of the new facility.

to safely accommodate vehicles travelling at 80 kilometres per hour, following extensive testing by both engineers and police officials.

Minister Edghill said he drove across the bridge at 80 kilometres per hour and found the journey smooth and comfortable. He noted that it took only about two and a half minutes to travel from one end to the other, highlighting the efficiency of the new facility.

Expanded support for working families to be rolled out -Dr Jagdeo

THE government has outlined a new phase in strengthening Guyana's social safety net, unveiling incoming reforms to modernise the public assistance system and new measures that will see expanded support for working families, including state-funded childcare facilities

Vice President, Dr Bharrat Jagdeo made these announcements last week during a press conference at the Arthur Chung Conference Centre (ACCC), where he spoke extensively on improving access to benefits for vulnerable and low-income families.

As he continued to explain some of the incoming reforms to Guyana's public assistance system—including to the Board of Guardians — he pledged a fairer, faster, and more transparent process for citizens seeking social support.

He said: "In terms of what we fund for the five years in government—social security, people who are eligible for help on public assistance. The complaint has been... through the Board of Guardians... And so clearly, we have to reform the system. And the system is currently being reformed."

The Ministry of Human Services and Social Security's Public Assistance programme remains a lifeline for thousands of Guyanese, providing temporary relief to persons with disabilities and those experiencing severe financial hardship.

In August, President, Dr. Irfaan Ali announced that the public assistance given to vulnerable citizens will be increased to a minimum of \$40,000.

This venture, he said, means an additional \$19 billion will be spent annually on vulnerable groups.

Currently, public assistance is \$22,000 and this has injected an additional \$1.4 billion into the pockets of some 40,000 recipients across the country

Earlier this year, the Government of Guyana demonstrated its commitment to strengthening social safety nets by allocating a substantial \$58.5 billion budget to the ministry for 2025.

Further, the Vice President made it clear that if a citizen is in a low-income bracket, then they should be able to qualify for benefits once they meet certain metrics.

"And those metrics would be clearly identified by the Board of Guardians and then implemented. It's either you meet the metrics or not—you qualify under those metrics. And once that is done, then the people who are im-

plementing the system cannot capriciously say you're eligible or not eligible based on their own, maybe, prejudices," Dr Jagdeo said, adding: "If you're disabled, then automatically you should be on the system...What I'm conveying is that work is being done on improving this system, so that we can roll it out next year, allowing people to get benefits faster, and for those who are eligible to be able to get onto the database swiftly on the basis of existing criteria, through which they would be qualified. I want to say to people, work is being done on that, too, because that was one of the big complaints we had."







Can Mohamed's take up seat as Opposition leader in National Assembly?

The Vigilant Political Action
Committee (VPAC) has issued a strong
call for a consensus opposition leader
to be named in light of a formal indictment of the We Invest in Nationhood
(WIN) Party Leader and Member of
Parliament-elect, Azruddin Mohamed,
in the United States on serious criminal
charges.

According to VPAC, the charges, which have been derived from an extensive investigation by U.S. authorities, have cast a 'dark shadow' over the integrity of the country's parliamentary system and raise significant doubts about Mohamed's future participation in the National Assembly.

"If it has not already been initiated, we fully expect the United States Government to issue a formal extradition request to the Government of Guyana, which, from all indications, will be granted," a statement from the party read

"Once extradited, there is serious doubt that he would be granted bond, given the gravity of the charges and the clear interest of US authorities in securing his immediate custody," VPAC added.

In light of these developments, VPAC is urging the senior leadership of all Opposition parties to urgently convene and determine a consensus candidate for the role of Leader of the Opposition, as well as to decide on who will be nominated as Deputy Speaker of the National Assembly.

"The Opposition cannot afford to stumble out of the gate. The eyes of the country and indeed the world are now on how the Opposition conducts itself in this delicate moment. With WIN holding 16 seats, APNU 12, and the Forward Guyana Movement One, it is not the time for jockeying, grandstanding, or internal rivalries," VPAC added.

In its statement, VPAC also

stressed that opposition must first demonstrate an ability to lead itself before it can credibly offer leadership to the people of Guyana.

U.S. prosecutors recently unsealed an indictment against Nazar Mohamed and his son, Azruddin Mohamed. The paper trail painted a clear picture of an alleged sophisticated scheme to evade millions in taxes and royalties owed to Guyana while funnelling their wealth through international wires, shipping companies and luxury assets.

A 17-page indictments handed down in the Southern District of Florida sketch a trail of gold and deceit that began in 2017, during the tenure of the APNU+AFC Coalition government and allegedly ran for seven years across flowing from Georgetown to Miami and from Dubai to California, through a system designed to evade taxes and enrich the men behind one of Guyana's largest gold exporters.

According to U.S. prosecutors, the family business, Mohamed's Enterprise, paid the Guyana Revenue Authority (2 per cent tax) and Guyana Gold Board (5 per cent royalty) the required taxes and royalties on select gold shipments in order to secure official seals.

Meanwhile, criminal charges have since been instituted against Azruddin under the Customs Act, Chapter 82:01, with hearings ongoing before the Georgetown Magistrates' Courts.

The junior Mohamed is charged under the Customs Act with knowingly making and subscribing to a false declaration to the GRA on or about December 7, 2020, by declaring the purchase price of a 2020 Lamborghini Roadster SVJ as US\$75,300, while the authority contends the actual value of the vehicle was US\$695,000.

'A legacy worth millions' - India's former royals who draw a meagre pension

In Hussainabad, in the northern Indian state of Uttar Pradesh, 90-year-old Faiyaz Ali Khan makes his way to the Picture Gallery, a 19th Century building that is a relic of the city's royal past.

His hands tremble as he walks, but there is a sparkle in his eyes. He has come to collect his wasika or royal pension.

Wasika, from the Persian word for a written agreement, is a pension granted to the descendants and associates of the rulers of the former Awadh kingdom. Awadh, now the central region of Uttar Pradesh, was ruled by semi-autonomous Muslim rulers - called nawabs - until the British annexed it in 1856.

India no longer has a monarchy, and former royals do not have any titles, privileges or special payments, known as privy purses. However, while their kingdoms and political power have long disappeared, some pension arrangements have continued for descendants of these families in states including Uttar Pradesh, Kerala and Rajasthan.

Roshan Taqui, a historian of Lucknow, where Hussainabad is located, says that in the early 1800s some members of the Awadh royal family lent money to the East India Company - which was then a British trading enterprise - on condition that the interest be paid out as pensions to their families. These loans were perpetual, meaning the Company never had to return the principal amount.

But soon, the British gained power in the region while the nawabs became weaker.

Around that time, Mr Taqui says, several nawabs were also forced to lend money to the Company, which needed it to fight the Afghan war.

Standing outside the Picture Gallery, which was built during the reign of former Awadh ruler Mohammad Ali Shah, Faiyaz Ali Khan says he has come to collect his payment after 13 months.

"We've been receiving this wasika since the time of our great-grandparents. It's so little that I only come once a year to collect it," he said.

The pension amount is meagre, just nine rupees and 70 paise (\$0.11; £0.08) a month, but for his family, it is about honour - their last living link to a once-rich past.

"Even if we get just one paisa, we'll spend a thousand rupees to come and collect it," says his son Shikoh Azad. Today, around 1,200 people - known as wasikedars - continue to collect these pensions.

However, the payouts are neither fixed nor uniform and decrease with each generation. For instance, if a person received 100 rupees and had two children, the pension would be halved after their death, leaving each with 50 rupees. As descendants grew over time, the share of pensions became even smaller.

The distribution of wasika began in 1817 when Bahu Begum, the wife of Awadh's Nawab Shuja-ud-Daula, gave 40m rupees to the East India Company in two instalments on the condition that her relatives and associates receive monthly pensions, according to Mr Taqui.

Official records show that other people linked to the royal family also gave loans to the Company on similar terms.

After India became independent in 1947, part of the money loaned by Bahu Begum was placed in a bank

According to Uttar Pradesh's wasika officer SP Tiwari, about 3m rupees was first deposited in the Reserve Bank of Kolkata (formerly Calcutta) and later moved to Kanpur and then Lucknow. Today, the pensions are paid out from the interest earned on around 2.6m rupees deposited in a local bank in the city.

The payments are made by two offices in the Picture Gallery: the Hussainabad Trust, run by Lucknow's district administration, and the Uttar Pradesh government's wasika office. The government now transfers pensions directly into bank accounts, while the Trust pays in cash.

Danish Ansari, Uttar Pradesh's minority welfare minister, says the wasika is given out as per policy and that the practice "dates back to the Nawabs of Awadh".

Critics argue that these allowances are remnants of feudal privilege and should have no role today. But supporters see them as honorary compensations tied to historical promises that cannot be easily brushed aside.

Shahid Ali Khan, a lawyer who is also a beneficiary of the royal pension, points to his own family's legacy. His grandfather was a minister to Nawab Mohammad Ali Shah.

Guyana Opposition leader Mohamed indicted in US on fraud charges

Just over a month after leading his newly formed We Invest in Nationhood (WIN) political party to become the main opposition in the Guyana National Assembly, billionaire businessman Azruddin Mohamed has been indicted by a United States grand jury on multiple fraud-related charges.

According to U.S. authorities, Mohamed and his father, businessman Nazar "Shell" Mohamed, have been charged with wire and mail fraud, and conspiracy to commit money laundering. The charges stem from allegations of tax evasion related to gold exports and the importation of a Lamborghini luxury vehicle.

If convicted of conspiracy to commit wire and mail fraud, both men—who were sanctioned by the U.S.

Treasury Department's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) in June 2024—could face up to 20 years in prison on each count, three years of supervised release, and fines of up to US\$250,000 or twice the gross pecuniary gain or loss.

On the charges of wire fraud, Azruddin Mohamed could also face a 20-year prison sentence, three years of supervised release, and fines of up to US\$250,000 or twice the pecuniary gain or loss. For conspiracy to commit money laundering, the grand jury is seeking a maximum of 20 years' imprisonment, three years of supervised release, and a fine of US\$500,000 or the value of the property involved in the transaction.

The United States government has also requested that, upon conviction, the defendants forfeit to the U.S. "any property, real or personal, which constitutes or is derived from proceeds traceable to such offense." The property listed for forfeiture includes a shipment containing approximately US\$5.3 mil-

lion in gold bars exported from Guyana by Mohamed's Enterprise and seized at Miami International Airport on June 11, 2024.

According to the unsealed indictment, between 2017 and June 2024, the defendants "did knowingly, and with the intent to further the objects of the conspiracy, combine, conspire, confederate, and agree with each other and others, known and unknown to the Grand Jury, to commit offenses against the United States."

The indictment alleges that the purpose of the conspiracy was for the defendants to unlawfully enrich themselves and defraud the government of Guyana of taxes and royalties owed on gold exports. The U.S. accuses the Mohameds of reusing empty boxes with intact Guyana Revenue Authority (GRA) and Guyana Gold Board (GGB)

seals for shipments of gold, to make it appear as if Mohamed's Enterprise had paid the required taxes and royalties when, in fact, it had not.

The grand jury further alleges that the Mohameds paid bribes to Guyanese government officials, including customs officers, so they would accept shipments of gold with duplicate paperwork and reused seals. The indictment claims the defendants shipped GRA and GGB seals from Miami to Mohamed's Enterprise in Guyana to facilitate the alleged scheme.

"Nazar Mohamed and Azruddin Mohamed reused empty boxes with intact GRA and GGB seals for shipments of gold to make it appear that Mohamed's Enterprise had paid Guyana taxes and royalties on shipments of gold when, in truth and in fact, Mohamed's Enterprise had not paid them on those shipments of gold," the court document states.

The indictment also includes allegations surrounding the purchase and importation of a Lamborghini valued at approximately US\$680,000. The U.S. grand jury alleges that Azruddin Mohamed directed an unnamed individual—referred to as "Individual 1"—to acquire the car in California for his benefit and arrange its shipment from Miami to Guyana.

He allegedly instructed the individual to create a falsified invoice showing the Lamborghini's value as US\$75,300, far below its actual price, and caused the fake document to be presented to the Guyana Revenue Authority. This alleged act enabled him to evade more than one million dollars in import taxes owed to the Guyanese government.

Child among five dead in Linstead mass shooting

A quiet Sunday evening in the community of Commodore, Linstead, was shattered by gunfire when armed men, posing as police officers, attacked a family yard late Sunday, leaving five people dead and four others injured. Among the dead is a four-year-old child.

The shooting occurred around 8:45 p.m. along Commodore main road when several men, some reportedly wearing police-style vests, entered the premises and opened fire on the occupants.

Assistant Commissioner of Police Christopher Phillips, who heads Area 5, described the attack as "very unfortunate and awful," noting that Linstead had been relatively calm before the tragedy.

"Nine persons were shot, five persons have so far been confirmed dead," ACP Phillips told Observer Online. "We are here trying to put together the pieces to determine what really triggered such an awful situation. The community of Linstead has been doing pretty well since this year." The deceased have been identified as four-yearold Shannon Gordon, a student of Rosemount Primary and Infant School; Mario Sullivan, 42, of Rosemount District; Jushane Edwards, 19, of Rosemount District; Iysha Washington, 39, a vendor of Rosemount District; and Famous Amos, 22, a security guard of Commodore District.

Police confirmed that six males and three females were shot in the attack; two females and three males succumbed to their injuries.

ACP Phillips said the location was known to the police, having been visited on several occasions due to "long-standing issues and challenges" involving the family.

"The indicators so far are suggesting that this might be a continuation of gang conflict, which comes as a surprise to us because this area has been quiet for a while," he said. "Unfortunately among the numbers we have a four-year-old who was brutally killed... the community is in shock."

Senior investigators and multiple police units were deployed to the scene as authorities worked to track down those responsible.

Phillips noted that prior to Sunday night's attack, the Linstead area had recorded only eight murders this year, compared to more than 20 during the same period in 2024.

"Linstead was doing pretty well and so this really comes as a shocker to us," he said.

Investigations are ongoing.

Trinidad Prime Minister expands portfolio in Cabinet reshuffle

Trinidad and Tobago Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar has taken on additional responsibilities following a reshuffling of ministerial portfolios, which also saw the renaming of two ministries. The adjustments were made by the President on the advice of the Prime Minister, in accordance with section 79(1) of the Constitution.

While Persad-Bissessar has not commented publicly on the changes, Minister of Public Utilities and Minister in the Office of the Prime Minister Barry Padarath told Newsday that the reassignment aims to "harmonise the agencies and state enterprises where there is a natural fit, as well as for better operations and functionality."

According to a gazette notice published on October 4, Padarath was assigned new responsibilities for Power Generation, Trinidad Generation Unlimited, and Powergen—portfolios that were previously under the purview of Minister of Energy and Energy Industries Dr Roodal Moonilal.

Speaking with Newsday on October 5, Padarath welcomed the additions, noting that the arrangement had existed many years ago and would better align with his current oversight of the Trinidad and Tobago Electricity Commission (T&TEC). He said the changes would allow for a review of existing power purchase agreements, which he claimed were neglected by the previous administration.

"Further, the impact of the excess power on the national grid is something that we are looking at in terms of our partnerships with commercial entities," Padarath said. "During the PNM administration for the last nine-plus years, very little was addressed in the area of power generation in TT. It is our intention to review the agreements, make them more commercially viable, and explore untapped areas for investment. Of course, this will be done in consultation with all stakeholders as a long-term plan for the sector."

Dr Moonilal also expressed support for the changes, saying the realignment will enable his ministry to focus on other priorities.

"Realignment of portfolio areas lends itself to better synergies and efficiencies. Our sector is not the same as it was a decade ago," he said. "I am happy to concentrate more on our regional energy and investment footprint and the key high-hanging fruits, as the country has already witnessed. Our economic future still depends highly on the energy sector and our reemergence as the hemispheric energy hub."

The reshuffle also expands the Prime Minister's own responsibilities. Persad-Bissessar will now directly oversee matters relating to Heritage Buildings, Constitutional Reform, the National Trust, National Commission for Self-Help Limited, National Library Services, and the National Library and Information System

Authority. Additionally, she will assume responsibility for the Home Improvement Grants Policy, the Housing and Village Improvement Programme

(HVIP), and the Government-Aided Self-Help Housing Programme (GASHHP), which were previously under the portfolios of Minister of Culture and Community Development Michelle Benjamin, Minister of Housing David Lee, and Minister of Public Administration Dominic Smith.

US is now Barbados' top tourist market

recorded a 5.43 per cent increase in stayover arrivals between January and August 2025, for a total of 503,000 visitors. And for the first time, the United States on airlift expansion for the US becoming (US) has surpassed the United Kingdom (UK) as the island's leading source mar-

Barbados Tourism Marketing Inc.'s (BTMI) Chief Executive Officer, Andrea Franklin, said the US led tourist arrivals, followed by the UK and the Caribbean.

"Arrivals from the United States of America stand at 179,753 visitors, making the US now our number one source market this year," she said on Friday, the final day of the Caribbean Tourism Organisation's State of the Tourism Industry Conference at the Hilton Barbados Resort. "This is particularly significant because all of you who may know Barbados and the history of tourism in Barbados, you know that the United Kingdom has always been our number one source market."

"This year, as well, we have the Caribbean performing very well. They

Barbados' tourism sector has are now our number three market, with 70,984 visitors coming from the region," she stated.

> Franklin credited the BTMI's focus the leading source market for the island.

> "So, what we did was a real double down on our airlift strategy. And we really went after building airlift to the destination out of the US market. So, in winter 2025, we had in excess of 60,000 additional seats from the US market. So, our airlift strategy was the pivotal point for us in terms of building the capacity to the destination out of the market," she explained.

> "From January to August this year, stayover arrivals in Barbados increased by 5.43 per cent compared to the same period in 2024. That's an additional 25,000 visitors who chose our island. To put that into perspective, arrivals grew from 477,891 in 2024 to 503,000 in 2025. These numbers tell us that Barbados is not only attracting more visitors but also strengthening its position as a destination of choice in the region."

Cruise arrivals also showed growth, with 117,776 more passengers visiting the island.

"Cruise performance so far for the year, and our stats are only showing January to July, we've welcomed 599,826 cruise passengers, which is a growth of 24 per cent over the same period," Franklin reported.

She further revealed that the Barbados Port Inc. is enhancing its cruise infrastructure to improve the visitor experience.

"Some of the things that the port are working on are ongoing modernisation and expansion of the facility at the Bridgetown Cruise Terminal, including improving the passenger flow, embarkation and disembarkation services and port aesthetics. Plans are also on the way for greener port operations, including looking at digitalisation and shore power readiness and the introduction of smart port technology to streamline logistics and enhance operational efficiency," she

Kamla wins People's Choice Leader Award at Caribbean Global Awards

Trinidad and Tobago Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar received the People's Choice Leader Award at the 2025 Caribbean Global Awards, held at the Cumberland Hotel in London on September 27.

The award, determined by public vote, saw Persad-Bissessar top a list that included Barbados' Mia Mottley, St Vincent and the Grenadines' Ralph Gonsalves, Jamaica's Andrew Holness, and Guyana's Dr Mohamed Irfaan Ali. Ralph Gonsalves placed second, Mottley third, and Holness and Ali finished fourth and fifth, respectively.

Addressing the ceremony via video from New York, Persad-Bissessar said, "It is indeed a profound honour to accept the Caribbean Global People's Choice Leader Award 2025. I do regret not being with you in person. However, my duties at the United Nations General Assembly have called me to New York where I carry the voice of Trinidad and Tobago and of our small island nations, speaking for resilience, fairness and the dignity and future of all people, especially our children."

She stressed that the award reflects collective achievement. "Yet even as I stand on that world stage, my heart is here with you because this award belongs not to me alone but to all of us who believe that unity is our greatest strength."

Persad-Bissessar reflected on her upbringing and journey into leadership, saying, "I was born in colonial Trinidad into a poor family in the rural village of Siparia. My late mother Rita sold roti to support our family whilst my father Lalraj worked as a bookkeeper. Highlighting her achievements in public service, she said, "Throughout four decades of public service, I have sought to turn compassion and equality into action. Sandals to begin design of \$500M Beaches Resort in St. Vincent in 2026

Sandals Resorts International (SRI) CEO Adam Stewart has announced that the company will begin designing a new Beaches resort at Mt Wynne in 2026, marking another major investment in Saint Vincent and the Grenadines' tourism landscape.

Speaking at a signing ceremony in Buccament Bay on Monday, Stewart said the new project represents a US\$500 million investment and will feature approximately 500 rooms. The planned resort is expected to employ nearly 2,000 Vincentians once fully operational.

The new Beaches resort will showcase local inspiration, with Stewart noting that the Red Lane Spa will draw on the island's volcanic minerals and cultural heritage. "This is a volcanic island, and we're going to use those minerals, all that history, and infuse it into the next generation of Red Lane Spa," he said.

From cuisine to design, Stewart promised the property would reflect the best of Saint Vincent and the Grenadines. "Gastronomically, we're

going to go overboard," he said, referencing Buccan — a Sandals concept restaurant that sources its ingredients from local farmers. "From a water park point of view, we're going to build something extraordinary."

St. Kitts joins Regional Agricultural Insurance Programme

The St. Kitts and Nevis government has welcomed the inclusion of the twin-island Federation in the Regional Economical Agri-Insurance Programme (REAP), developed by the St. Vincent and the Grenadines-based Lynch Caribbean Brokers Ltd.

The announcement was made during the 19th Caribbean Week of Agriculture (CWA 2025), recently held in St. Kitts. Agriculture, Fisheries and Marine Resources Minister Samal Duggins described the initiative as a vital pillar for national resilience and regional innovation.

"Agriculture and fisheries remain at the heart of our nation's food security, livelihoods, and economic resilience. Yet, farmers and fishers are increasingly vulnerable to risks beyond their control—climate change, unpredictable weather patterns, natural disasters, pests, and market volatility," Duggins said.

Under the REAP project, local farmers and fishers will benefit from a regional insurance programme designed to reduce vulnerability to natural disasters, market shocks, and the growing impacts of climate change. The initiative, set to launch soon in partnership with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Marine Resources, offers a flexible multi-peril parametric insurance model tailored for the agriculture and fisheries sectors.

Unlike traditional insurance systems that rely on individual loss assessments, REAP uses advanced index-based data and satellite monitoring to trigger payouts once pre-defined thresholds are met or surpassed. The coverage spans crops, livestock, and fisheries, providing comprehensive protection for producers across the Federation.

The government will cover the insurance premiums for all registered

farmers and fishers. Once a payout index is triggered, beneficiaries are notified within two to three weeks, and payments are distributed directly per policy.

St. Kitts and Nevis is among nine Caribbean Community (CARICOM) countries that have signed onto the programme. St. Lucia officially launched REAP in July 2025.

Lynch Caribbean Brokers Managing Director Damian Bowen said the programme's design was informed by extensive national consultations. "REAP's development was the result of careful collaboration with key stakeholders during the first quarter of 2025," he said. "Together with experts from the Ministry of Agriculture and members of the farming and fishing communities, we created a model tailored to real needs rather than abstract assumptions."

In a statement, Lynch Caribbean

Brokers Ltd added that "REAP is not a product on a shelf, it is an agri-insurance value chain in motion," integrating technology, local expertise, and regional cooperation to build agricultural resilience.

Beyond financial protection, REAP will introduce livelihood protection measures, a national enrolment campaign, public education seminars, and digital dashboards aimed at improving transparency and data-driven decision-making across the sector.

Minister Duggins reaffirmed the government's commitment to building resilience in agriculture and fisheries. "These tools are not luxuries—they are necessities that provide a safety net, ensuring that the men and women who dedicate their lives to feeding our people can recover quickly after shocks and continue their work without being pushed into financial hardship," he said.

T&T Prisons Chief: over 600 drone drops into Maximum Security Jail

Acting Commissioner of Prisons Hayden Forde says more than 600 drone drops have been detected across Trinidad's prisons between April and October this year, with the majority occurring at the Maximum Security Prison in Arouca.

Forde, speaking on a local television programme Monday, said the growing use of drones to smuggle contraband has become a serious challenge for prison authorities, adding that some officers are also complicit in the illegal activity.

"The greatest challenge that we face on a daily basis would be drone flights. Drone flights take place every single day," Forde said. "So, the criminal realise that that's a weak spot and they are actually using that to their advantage. Despite that we have officers who are intercepting some of those drops, the vast majority, obviously based on the flight patterns... we have not been able to intercept."

He revealed that between April 4 and October 4, 2025, prison officials recorded 626 drone sightings, most of which occurred over the Maximum Security Prison — home to the largest population of remanded inmates.

Forde said that while officers have managed to recover some of the contraband, the prison system lacks the necessary technology and resources to effectively counter the problem. He also admitted that several officers have been aiding in the smuggling operations.

"We have several rogue officers

who are operating in our system. Despite efforts to weed them out, they are still in our system," he said. "They are complicit, and I am not going to hide that at all... as far as I am concerned they are gang members, they are part of a criminal network."

The comments follow a recent joint operation in which police and prison officers arrested two people — including a 13-year-old boy — who allegedly attempted to fly a drone loaded with marijuana, cigarettes, wrapping

paper, and cellphones into the Maximum Security Prison.

Forde said talks are ongoing with Minister of Homeland Security Roger Alexander on possible countermeasures, including anti-drone systems capable of detecting, disabling, or tracking the devices back to their operators.

"What is really needed are antidrone devices that are in a fixed place, but can cover a certain radius and... detect it, capture it, defuse it," he said. "It can send it back to the operator where the police can follow the drone and make an arrest if possible."

The prison chief also expressed alarm over the involvement of minors in smuggling operations. "It seems as though they are training people to get involved in criminal activities and continue on that line," Forde said. "That is alarming to us as a society, because basically what they're doing is succession planning... ensuring that crime is not abated in this country."





Bernard Julien, World Cup hero, remembered for grace and grit

The West Indies cricket community is mourning the passing of Bernard Julien, one of the region's most gifted all-rounders and a proud member of the legendary team that captured the inaugural Men's Cricket World Cup in 1975.

Julien, who combined elegance at the crease with guile and precision as a left-arm seamer, passed away on Saturday night at his home in Valsayn, northwest Trinidad, at the age of 75, a family member confirmed.

The outpouring of tributes from across the Caribbean spoke not only to Julien's sporting brilliance but to the warmth of his character and the enduring mark he left on generations of players and fans alike.

From Sir Clive Lloyd, his former captain and long-time friend, to Cricket West Indies (CWI) and the West Indies Players' Association (WIPA), the tributes formed a single chorus of respect for a man whose career embodied both triumph and complexity.

Together, they hailed Julien as a cricketer of rare talent and deep integrity — a man who not only helped shape the West Indies' early dominance in world cricket but also navigated the sport's most challenging moral crossroads with humanity and grace.

Leading the tributes, Sir Clive Lloyd remembered Julien as a dependable, selfless teammate and a cornerstone of the World Cup-winning side.

"He always gave you over 100 percent," Lloyd recalled. "He never



shirked his duties, and I could always rely on him with bat and ball. He gave his all every time ... what a fine cricketer"

The former West Indies captain also spoke fondly of Julien's spirit and humility.

"We all had total respect for him. He enjoyed himself and was loved by everyone around. I remember we won the Test match at Lord's and stood there signing autographs for a long time. He was good for us and was held in high regard everywhere we went."

CWI: "A quiet legend of the 1975 World Cup"

In a moving statement, Cricket West Indies (CWI) President Dr. Kishore Shallow reflected on Julien's dual legacy — his cricketing excellence and the social complexities that defined his era.

"The passing of Bernard Julien invites reflection on both the brilliance of his cricketing life and the complex times through which he lived," Shallow said. "His career reminds us that the story of West Indies cricket is not only about triumphs on the field but about the choices and circumstances that shaped generations of players and the region itself."

Shallow described Julien as "one of the quiet legends of the 1975 World Cup," noting that the tournament — half a century ago — brought a sense of Caribbean unity and joy like no other.

"His skill and composure were central to that victory," Shallow added. "To the family, friends, and loved ones of Bernard Julien, we extend our deepest condolences."

WIPA: "We honor his lasting contribution"

The West Indies Players' Association (WIPA) also expressed deep sorrow, extending sympathy to Julien's family and loved ones.

WIPA president and CEO, Wavell Hinds, said: "WIPA expresses sincere condolences to the friends and family of former West Indies cricketer Bernard Julien. May you find strength and peace amid your grief. We honor Bernard Julien's lasting contribution to the game we love; may his soul rest in peace."

A career of brilliance and depth Born in Carenage, Trinidad, in 1950, Bernard Julien's cricketing journey began at 18, when he made his first-class debut. By 23, he was wearing the maroon cap for the West Indies

on their 1973 tour of England — a series in which he announced himself with flair and authority.

At Lord's, the "Home of Cricket," he scored a magnificent 121 off 127 balls, sharing a record partnership with Sir Garfield Sobers, who remained unbeaten on 150. It was the kind of innings that signaled the arrival of a player of rare poise and power.

Two years later, Julien's all-round brilliance shone again on the world stage. During the 1975 World Cup, he delivered match-winning spells of 4 for 20 against Sri Lanka and 4 for 27 against New Zealand in the semi-final at The Oval — performances that propelled the West Indies into the final, where they defeated Australia to lift cricket's first world crown.

In total, Julien played 24 Test matches, scoring 866 runs at an average of 30.92 and taking 50 wickets at 37.36. In One-Day Internationals, he claimed 18 wickets at 25.72.

A complex chapter and an enduring legacy

Julien's international career came to an early close following his participation in the 1982–83 rebel tours to South Africa — a decision that resulted in a life ban from West Indies cricket at

the height of the apartheid boycott.

Dr. Shallow acknowledged the moral and personal struggles of that period, noting that such choices reflected "the difficult realities of that era and the pressures faced by players navigating competing demands of opportunity, conscience, and circumstance."

Yet for all the turbulence, Julien's contributions remain woven into the tapestry of West Indian cricket — his artistry with bat and ball, his quiet dignity, and his place among the pioneers who laid the foundation for future generations.

Remembering a gentleman of the game

For the Caribbean cricket family, Bernard Julien will be remembered as more than a statistic or a scorecard entry. He was part of the West Indies' coming of age — a cricketer whose performances embodied a people's pride and whose life mirrored the struggles and triumphs of his time.

As Sir Clive Lloyd put it, "He gave his all every time."

That spirit — of effort, excellence, and enduring grace — is what will forever define Bernard Julien, one of West Indies cricket's quiet giants.

Indian legend Gavaskar delivers blistering rating of WI after rout


Indian cricket icon Sunil Gavaskar has delivered a blistering assessment of the West Indies' latest Test humiliation, lamenting that the once-feared Caribbean pace battery now resembles a group of "net bowlers" after their innings-and-140-run defeat to India in the opening Test.

The contest, so one-sided it barely rippled the cricketing world, stood in stark contrast to the bygone era when a victory over the West Indies would have been headline news across continents. The team that once embodied swagger, speed, and dominance now appeared a pale shadow of its illustrious past.

"Is this really the West Indies pace attack?"

Writing in his Sportstar column, Gavaskar spared little in his critique of the visitors' bowling, singling out only Jayden Seales for praise.

"In Ahmedabad, apart from Jayden Seales, the other two were simply trundlers," Gavaskar observed. "No disrespect intended to them, but to see the first bouncer being bowled after half a dozen overs had been bowled made one ask, 'Is this really the West Indies pace attack?""

He lamented the absence of intimidation and tactical sharpness — traits that once defined Caribbean fast bowling. Gavaskar emphasized that while

the short ball demands considerable effort, it remains an essential "surprise weapon" capable of unsettling even the most accomplished batters.

"It's not just about raw pace," he implied, "but about the intent to challenge — to make the batsman think twice."

The gulf in class between the two sides was glaring, particularly with the bat. India's line-up — led by KL Rahul, Dhruv Jurel, and Ravindra Jadeja, each registering centuries — piled on a mountain of runs with clinical authority. In response, the West Indies' effort was timid and fragmented, with only Alick Athanaze (38) and Justin Greaves (32) showing brief signs of resistance.

Gavaskar described the display as dispiriting for fans who remember the Caribbean's golden era, when batting icons such as Viv Richards, Clive Lloyd, Gordon Greenidge, and Brian Lara struck fear into bowlers worldwide.

"For a team that once boasted of the likes of Viv Richards, Clive Lloyd, Gordon Greenidge, and Brian Lara," he wrote, "there is simply nobody in this current team who looks like getting a million country miles close to them."

The West Indies have not won a single Test against India since 2002, a stretch spanning 25 matches, of which India have triumphed in 15.


